hanging Colorg in the House, damaged by coming hand in the Winter, as well as the Ships tore to Piece. Ships coming thus, all the Year round, is employed to difficit any Market, and it has colt them the interest and in the Sales, from what they have hard have had in the Sammer. I am jedous a great lart of the Delay his proceeded from the ill Opinion our Principals in Alaphard have had of our Management at London: Therefore am in hopes, when they ich us doing all in our Power to retrieve Things, they will be friend us, in giving the Ships all Poffice Dispatch; as well as a Frieght that will maintain the Ships, which Seven Pounds for Ton will never do.

ANOTHER and main Advantage by fuch a Correspondency with the Clubs in Virginia and Mieriand, will be Unanimity among us at London: For, upon acquiinting them of fuch Persons that either will not come into, or break Agreements after male, they will find an essis and natural Way to make such Persons sensible of their Error; and, I think, nothing but Reason it should be so; for we are the expresentatives or Delegates of a great many Thousen i l'emple, whose Riead (or at least a comfortable Livelihood ) depends upon our good or had Minagement. It is a melancholly Confideration, i w much Money has been lust to Virginia and Man riland, by the low Price of Tobacco for some Years pist; which, in a great Measure is owing to our Difagreement.

I am not unsensible many Objections may be made to what I now propose: As, That the French will be out of Hamour, and so go to the Out Ports for Tobacco, which will give those Ports the Opportunity of clearing their Hands, while we are burthened with a Load upon our Hands; I know not but it may prove so: Even allowing that, I think we should try the Experiment. I make no doubt, when the
