French Agents, have every One in their Turns, erercifel over us : I need not mention Particulers ; wo all know how it has been; and firing One Perfon, I do not know One Merchant, but is feribes the Deciy. of the Frule, to the fime Crufe that I do.

THER REPORE Lam hopeful, now the Cruste is fo well known, every Body, both for their own Sikes, and the Literalt of their Employers, will joyn their Hearts and Hunds, to relieve themselves, and Friends, from to great Oppreffing. We are flriving for Nothing but our Livelihoods, and the Livelihoods of many Thoulands whom we represent, and whose Bread depends upon our good or had Management.

THEREFORE, is we are only striving to live, and are willing to let live, I think no l'erfon can, with Reason, be offe ded, at what we have been doing, or shall do, to attain so reasonable an

Ind.

BUT how to come at this End, is the great Quellion: That it is possible to be come at, is without Question. The Necessity of Endeavouring a Remedy, admits I think of as little Doubt: But the

Minner haw, is to be co-filered.

I'O willing Minds, every Thing will be enfy : Let every One but iim at the sime Mirk, and yield to one another, both in Opinion, and their separate I stereffer For in all Laws, and publick Agreements, whit may be good for the Whole in a publick Capacite, may pinch upon some private interest, in the Prictice or Execution. If that be not ficrifice to the Publick Good, no Society can prosper. Could we once come into this Frame of Mind, and unite Endeavours, we should soon surmount all Difficulties.

FROM the united Councils of all the Merchants, fare a Rame ly may be found to this growing Evil.
