make very few A's, though at Weighing off, I know they are not fo nice.

T O prevent all Disputes shout the different Qualiries, I think we had better, to the French, make but I'wo Sortments of Leaf: For such as they call A's, will be it no Proportion to B and C, hardly Five fach Hogsheads coming in an Hundred.

S O that were we to make Three Sortments, ABC, in equal Quantity, and let the middle Price be the Avarage Price for the Whole, I doubt that would be very difficult, if not impossible; the Seller and Buyer will fo differ bout the Quality.

TO prevent fuch Disputes, I can think of no better Will, than to put the Tobacco into Three Sort-

ments, 2/2.

T II I very best superfine Leaf, which will be but a few, into the first A; all the other Leaf to be very good, but inferiour to the A's, to be the Second Strenger, (or rather the First Sortment to the French) called B.

TH! Third, (or as I would have it, ) the Second Sort, to be called C, and to confift of good

Tobicco, proper for the French Ufe.

I would have a greater Disproportion made in the Price, between A and B, thin between B and G; which two last Sortments, may be made pretty near in Number and Quantity to one another; always allowing the Advantage to the Buyer.

WHATEVER Agreement shall be made. with the French, I propose may be only for B and C, and then whether the Price be made upon both Sitts together, or each separate, will break no
