(46) the People on the Eaftern Shore, and about P 4 Traffe. If they do not endeavour to have their Tobicco at Maket, as foon as their Neighbours of Virginia, they perer can have a Price. YOUR All mbly can do nothing to fo Publick a Good, as ro limit a Day, thei which no Tobacco shall be shipped for the Your. I think Mid-Immer should be the longest Time clinsed for Shipping, and from that Day to Christmas Day, no Tebacco to be flipp'd on any Prerence. This world oblige People to get their Confective ready be-

times, and then it would come Home in the Summer with a double Advantage : First, in better Quality free from Dimage, and Secondly to the Summer Market, which is always the best. In this Case, you would be upon a Level with Virginia; and we should, in some certain Time, know when we had all, and the Buyers done expeding for that Year, Ships coming as they have done of lite, all the Year round, have distracted all our Buyers, and made Things so bid as they've been.

Among the rest of the Advices I would have come from you; One should be to request us to be sparing in sending Tobicco to Holland for Sile, or rather that you may absolutely prohibit us to fend any of your Tobicco there, unless has been fire long upon Hind, that must be shipp'd to five the Drawbick. This I'm sure will be your Interest. Did the Buyers once know we were so restrain'd;

where there is now One, we should have Twenty Buyers; and that of it self would advance the Market.

IT would render my Work very tedious, were I to make such Observations on this Letter as occur to me: But as the Sense is obvious, and as I am unwilling to depart from the Method I have prescrib'd. to my felf, of only giving a true Narrative of Facts,

I shall therefore leave it to the Reader's own judicious Oblervation :
