Observation; and only remind him, that he will find the Lastraint line upon the Merchants not to lead any Tobacco to Halland, in the Letter brely factions, is here recommended. The next Letter from him was of the Second of May, directed to me in the Lastra; Some Paragraphs whereof are as follow, erg.

- I am just come from the Meeting; where we fluidled at the Triesthold, and shad like to have broke all to Pieces: The Dispute happened upon a Question proposed by Samuel Hyde, in the tollowing Words, viz.
- THAT finch Perfors who have colleded or charged the Three Pence per rioginead; and refole to pay the time, ought not to vote at any of our Meetings, till they've discharg'd their Arreurs.
- Heats; Some shift lately refusing to pry any Thing for Years path, although they both own'd they had received and charged the Three Pence per Hogherd in their Accounts to their Friends. This, by those that were willing to pay all Arrears, was thought very unreasonable, that any Body should pretend to convert to their own private Use, the Three Pence per Hogshead that they had collected from other People, for the Publick Stock. Had Thou been present, I'm persuaded this Opposition would not have been made; which shews the Necessity of some Gentleman from Maryland being here Yearly, to over-look our Behaviour: We
- fhall stand in Awe of their Presence. This Dispute makes me wish, That in your intended Letters to the General Meeting, you'll signify your Desire, That all your Factors may make no Helita-
