New Ownership Announced For McCord's

New ownership for one of the Eastern Shore's largest and most important companies has just been announced. McCord's Laundry, Inc., has been purchased from the estate of the late William Harold Fletcher by a group which consists of Theodore E. Fletcher, Jr., Louis F. Shortall, Phillip L. Harden, J. Thomas Saulsbury and Miss Virginia M. Wallace. All are officers of the new company and they form the Board of Directors. The last four named are all long-time employees and officers of the company.

The new officers are Mr. Fletcher, President; Mr. Shortall, Executive Vice President and Manager; Mr. Harden, First Vice President; Mr. Saulsbury, Second Vice President; Miss Wallace, Secretary and Treasurer. Division of department responsibility within the firm is as follows: Dry Cleaning Department, Mr. Shortall; Laundry, Mr. Harden; Sales, Mr. Saulsbury, and management of the Business Office, Miss Wallace.

McCord's Laundry, Inc., is one of the largest on the Peninsula. Its particular field of service is in Talbot, Caroline, Queen Anne's and Kent Counties, with headquarters at 120 South Washington Street, Easton, in Talbot County. The principal services are Storage, Laundry, Dry Cleaning and Rental Linens.

The company was founded in 1926 by Walter S. McCord. The original laundry location was at the present site in Easton. In 1933 the dry cleaning plant was established, and in 1939 the fur cleaning equipment and storage vault were installed. The College Cleaners at Chestertown, involving a dry cleaning plant, was bought in 1955 and the Talbot town store was opened in 1956. The acquisition of various other properties as needed took place as the company grew. In 1959, Hubbard Cleaners in St. Michaels was purchased.

In 1961 the entire business was sold to William Harold Fletcher, at which time it was incorporated under the name "McCord's Laundry, Inc.," and operated under the name "McCord's." This designation continues as the trading name. Pick-up stations are at the plant, 120-122 South Washington St., Easton, and at Talbot town; 111 East Water St., Centerville; 335 West High Street, Chestertown, and the College Cleaners subsidiary on Court Street, Chestertown. The company operates eleven truck routes with a fleet of fifteen trucks. The number of employees averages between 100 and 102.

Since William H. Fletcher passed away, the Board of Directors, besides the four mentioned above, has included H. Kirkus Dugdale, of Chestertown and Captiva, Florida, who also served as advertising counsellor. Mr. Dugdale was formerly with the Baltimore advertising firm of Vansant, Dugdale and Vansant. Walter S. McCord and Attorney Charles Elliott Wheeler served as members of the Board of Directors also.

Mr. Fletcher, the new President, has been a life-long resident of Preston, Caroline County. His wife was formerly Miss Helen Shufelt of Hurlock and they have three children - Mark, Linda and Carla. Mr. Fletcher is a partner in A. W. Sisk and Son, the nation's largest canned food brokers, from which he will be retiring July 1 to devote more time to McCord's. He is also a director of the Preston Trucking Company and a director of the Provident State Bank, Preston. He is a member of the Economic Development Committee of Caroline County.

Mr. Shortall, who has been with McCord's 32 years, was born in Queenstown, Queen Anne's county, and his wife is the former Dorothy Smith of Easton. He is a member of St. Peter and Paul's Catholic Church, is past president of the Easton Lions Club and past Exalted Ruler of B.P.O.E. Lodge 1622 in Easton. Mr. Shortall helped organize and served as president of the original P.T.A. in Easton. He helped organize and served as President of the Delmarva Laundry and Dry Cleaning Association, which represents the industry south of the Delaware - Chesapeake Canal.

Mr. Harden is a native of Trappe, Talbot County, and is married to the former Clara Jane Miles of Crisfield. He is a member of B.P.O.E. Lodge 1622 and is past director of the Maryland-D.C. - Virginia Laundry Owners Association. His service with McCord's has extended through 30 years.

Another who is a native of Talbot County is Mr. Saulsbury, who has been with McCord's 23 years. Mrs. Saulsbury is the former Dorothy Lambert of Easton. Mr. Saulsbury's fraternal affiliation is B.P.O.E. Lodge 1622 and he is a member of St. Mark's Methodist Church.

Talbot County was the birthplace of Miss Wallace, who, as well, is a member of St. Mark's Methodist Church. Her service

with McCord's has covered a period of 21 years and she was with Maryland - Credit Finance Corporation 14 years before joining McCord's staff.

"It is a pleasure and satisfaction to work with such a fine community as we have here on the Eastern Shore," Mr. Fletcher stated in assuming the presidency. "We appreciate the confidence our constituents have been showing through the years in building McCord's as one of the leading businesses of the Peninsula. We shall endeavor to continue to merit that confidence."

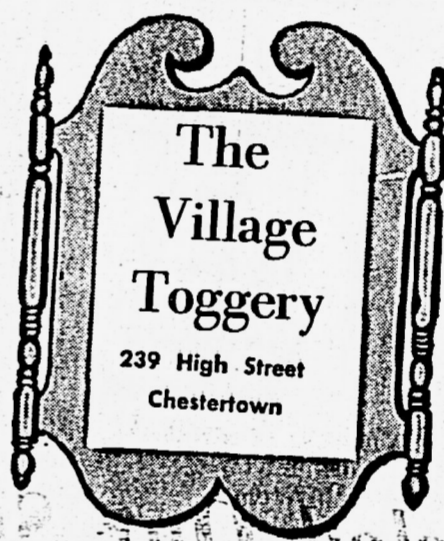
The idea for a registration night began at the Double Creek Church because of an interest in the camping program and a
