Carpet Color Determined By Soil Surveys

One of these days the American housewife may not be too concerned when the children track mud on her living-room carpeting, according to E. R. Kell, State Conservationist, USDA Soil Conservation Service at College Park, Maryland. She may not even notice it, for the carpeting may have the color of the predominant soil in the area woven right into it.

Carpet manufacturers have asked soil scientists with USDA's Soil Conservation Service for help in determining the general soil colors in different geographic regions of the United States with the idea of incorporating these colors in their carpet patterns. This information is available in soil surveys made and published by SCS.

More than 822 million acres -- or about a third of the Nation's land -- have already been surveyed. In Maryland approximately 90 percent of the land

area has been mapped. SCS soil scientists are currently mapping about 50 million acres each year in the U. S. and about 150,000 acres in Maryland. According to Ronald Hawk, Work Unit Conservationist, SCS at Chestertown, Kent was one of the first counties to be completed for soils mapping in Maryland.

Although soil surveys are used primarily by land owners and operators in determining the best use and the proper cultivation and conservation measures for their land, many others -- in addition to the carpet manufacturers -- have found them valuable according to Mr. Kell.

They are used by county and community planning officials in general planning and to locate suitable sites for housing, schools, shopping centers, airports, parking lots, and industries. They are used for evaluating wildlife habitat, for locating and building ponds for waterfowl, and in locating recreation, hunting, and fishing sites, Mr. Kell said. They are used as an aid in determining land assessment and real estate values.

They also are used in determining the suitability of soils for septic tank installation, in constructing highways.

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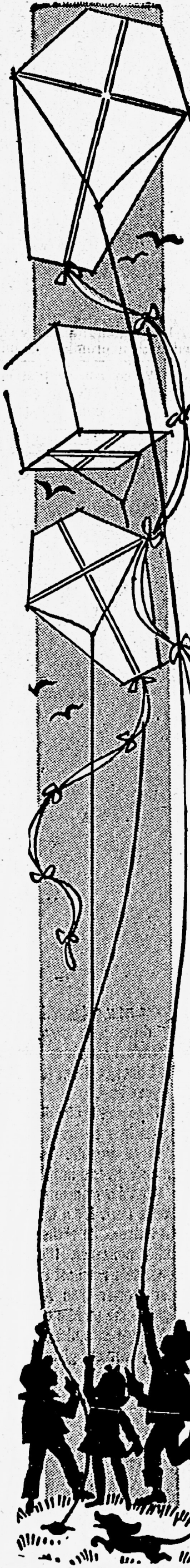
