in 1962. He has more than 20 guns in his racks at this time but favors a Remington 48.


But despite his devotion to skeet, his life is dedicated to serving the countryside as the family doctor.

The Maryland Game and Inland Fish Commission set hunting dates for the fall season over the weekend but decided against recommending an open season on swans to the Department of Interior.

Swans, like all other migratory fowl, are subject to federal regulations and state agencies can only pass restrictions within those regulations.

Since swans presently are protected, the state agency could have, at the most, suggested to the Interior Department that it create an open season on them.

Witnesses who appeared at a Saturday morning hearing by the commission strongly opposed any open season on swan. Most of those present were not hunters, said Edwin M. Barry. acting secretary to the commission. He said most hunters offered no opinions on the issue. The commission decided to

study the question further before it decided whether to request a limited swan season for management purposes. Most of the hunting seasons

were left unchanged from last

The deer season for firearms. and bow and arrow was set from Nov. 26, to Dec. 4. This will be for male deer only. The special bow and arrow season, which is open for taking deer of either sex, will be from Sept. 15 to Nov. 25, Dec. 6 to Dec. 16 and Dec. 20 to Dec. 25.

Dates for the rest of the seasons, with daily limit and possession limit in parentheses: Squirrel--Oct. 5-Nov. 13 (6 daily limit, 12 possession limit) Turkey -- Oct. 5-Nov. 25 (1 and 1)

Pheasant -- Nov. 15-Jan 31(2 Quail -- Nov. 15-Jan 31(6 and

Grouse -- Nov. 15-Jan 31, except Garrett and Allegany coun-

ties, Nov. 15-Jan. 5 (22 and 4) Rabbits -- Nov. 15-Jan 15 (4 Racoon and Possum -- Sept.

10-April 1 (no limit) Beaver -- Jan. 16-Feb.

Garrett, Allegany and Washington counties only (6 and 6) Otter, mink and muskrat --Jan, 1-March 15, except in Garrett, Allegany, Washington, Carroll, Howard, Montgomery and Frederick counties Nov. 15-Feb. 15 (no limit)

The commission set no open season on bear and no closed season on limits on skunk. woodchuck and fox. Fox hunting is regulated however, by some counties.
