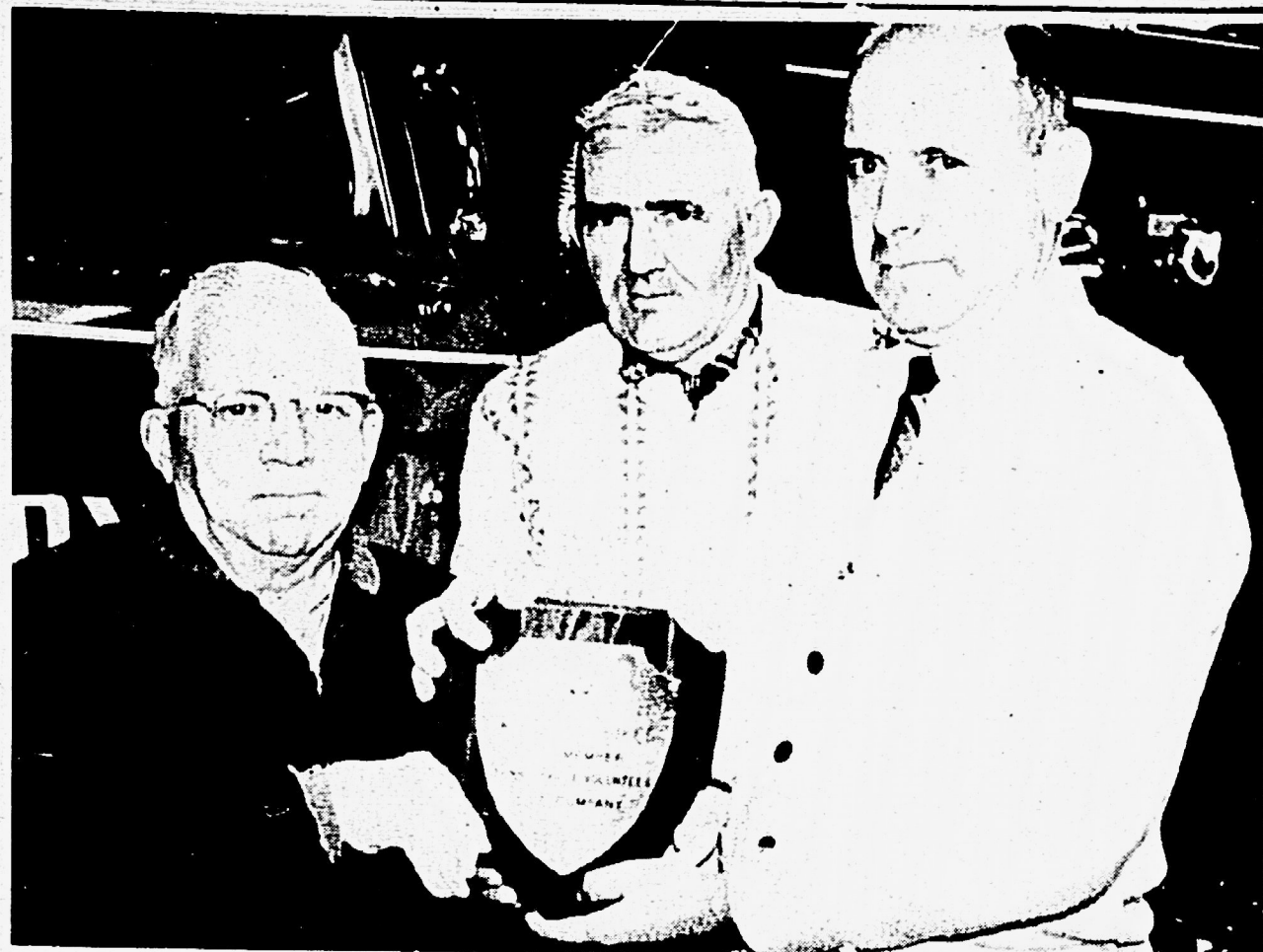
Foremans Find Fancy Hen Fruit!

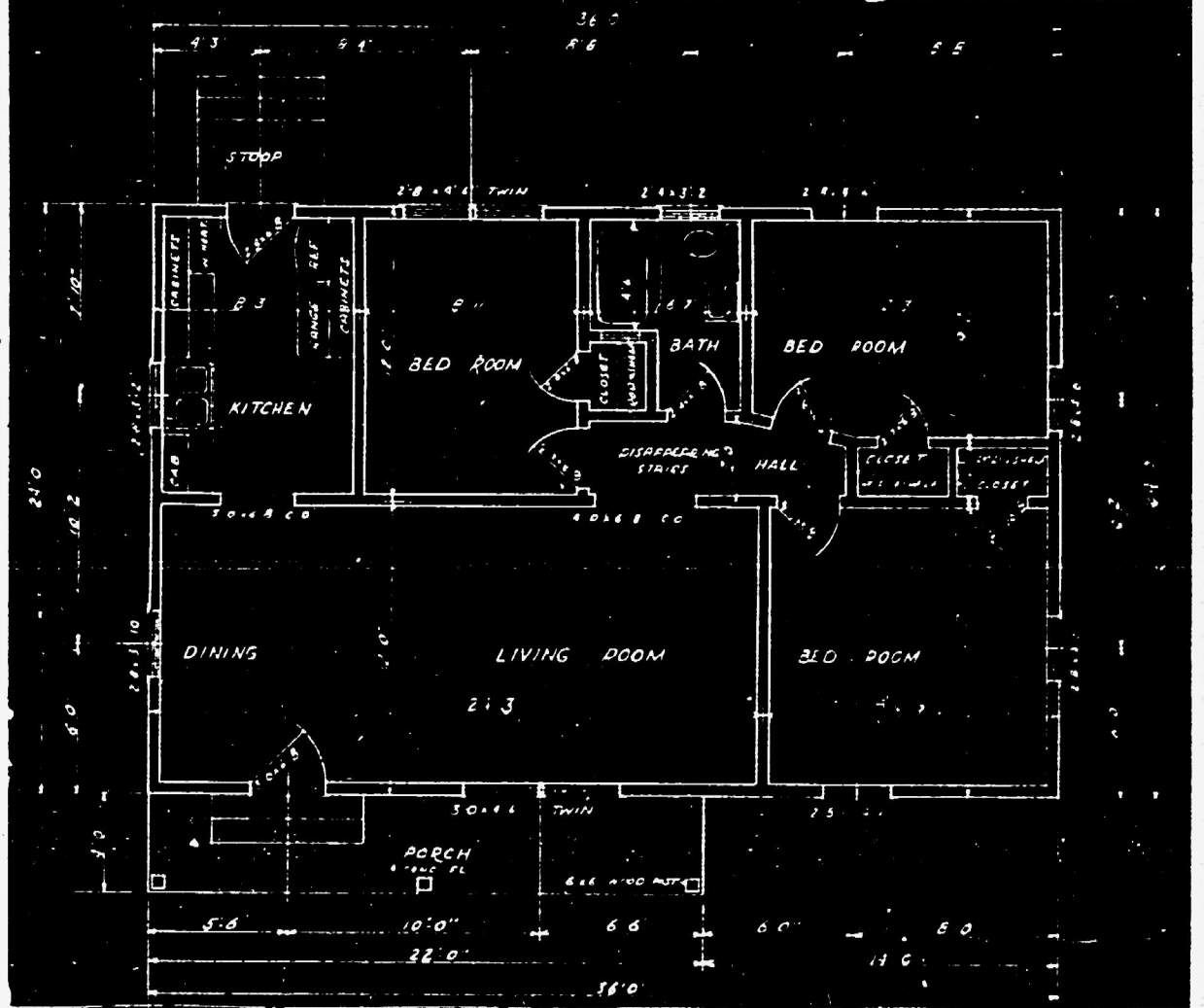
