In addition to the long list of new books being added to the Chestertown Library for May is a gift of the best seller QUEEN VICTORIA, BORN TO SUCCEED by Elizabeth Longford. The book was presented by Mrs. Emerson B. Roberts in memory of Mrs. William H. Seidel.

Nicholas Monsarrat delves into a modern marriage in his witty readable THE PILLOWFIGHT. THE SMILE ON THE FACE OF THE LION is a first novel by P. M. Pasinetti recounting the vicissitudes of two families of Venice before the second World War. A WINTER'S TALE by Nathaniel Benchley is a blend

OVER THE COUNTER, Year In the Village Shop by Sheila Turner is a novel filled with the serenity and beauty of English country life.

DOCTOR SAMARITAN is the latest in the long list of Doctor stories by Elizabeth Seifert. The American Mystery Story

Writers association has chosen THE NIGHT OF THE GENERALS by Hans Hellmut Kirst as the best suspense story of the year. It is a superb thriller with a good measure of Mr. Kirst's devastating humor.

RED PAWN is the story of Noel field the ex-worker for the U. S. Department of State who disappeared in Prague to reappear six years later from the communist prison where he had been held a prisoner. The story is told by Flora Lewis an American reporter.

Other good mysteries are: DOVER ONE by Joyce Porter; THE FINGER PRINT by Anthony Gilbert; THE THOUSAND DOORS by Abraham Rothberg and LYDIA by E. V. Cunningham.

Evelyn Waugh has published the first volume of his three volume autobiography written with the same refreshing frankness and wit which distinguishes his many novels in

"A LITTLE LEARNING." "MARKINGS" is a translation from the Swedish of the manuscript Dag Hammarskjöld left behind to be published after his death. Elizabeth Goudge has made a moving collection of both famous and little known pieces from writing through the ages and put them into "A BOOK OF COMFORT."

Howard Spring, author of "All The Day Long," has penned an eventful chronicle of warmth and awareness in "WINDS OF THE DAY." "THE FALL OF AN EAGLE," is a novel of modern Turkey by Jon Cleary.

Jon Christophere relates the terrifying nightmare of a group of guests in a Swiss Chateau when they are cut off from the world by an avalanche in "THE POSSESSORS."

"FUNERAL IN BERLIN," is a masterfully plotted and executed novel of international intrigue by Len Deighton. "WINTER OF MADNESS," by David Walker, relates a wild tale of love, war and mystery. "A COVENANT WITH

DEATH," is a fascinating court room drama by Stephen Becker.

"THE VISITORS," reveals a salty New England ghost story by Nathaniel Benchley. "MONEY FROM HOLME," is the latest mystery story by Michael Innes. "THE SAD VARIETY," plots a stunner of a suspense novel by Nicholas Blake.


