## Urge Oldsters To File For U.S. Benefits

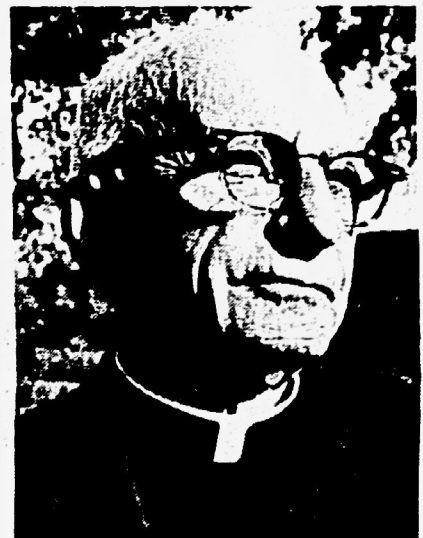
Eastern Shore residents in Maryland and Virginia 65 or over who have not yet applied for social security benefits were advised today to file a claim now even if they are not planning to retire right away.

In issuing the above advice, Mr. James G. Woodson, Social Security District Manager pointed out that several local people who applied last year found that they had lost some benefits by not applying earlier. "We have found," said Woodson, "that the best way for a person to protect his social security benefit rights is to apply at 65 whether or not he intends to go on working. Even if no benefits are payable right away, there's an advantage in having your claim already approved when you actually retire. With entitlement already established, the benefits can be started very soon when we are notified of the retirement date."

Woodson said that according to the latest figures there are nearly 19 million Americans who are 65 or over. Of that total, more than 14 million have already established their entitlement to social security monthly benefits, and 1.1 million are insured for benefits but have not yet filed their claims. The latter figure includes the wives of insured workers.

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## Father Kagey To Speak At Old St. Paul's

The Rev. Guy E. Kagey, retired priest formerly on the staff of Mt. Calvary Church, Baltimore, will be the preacher at the 11 a.m. service this Sunday, May 23rd, at Old St. Paul's, Kent. He will also be the celebrant at the 8 a.m. service of Holy Communion.

Last December Fr. Kagey was feted by many of his friends and former parishioners on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of his ordination, Dec. 20, 1914 in Wyoming. It was here that he began his ministry coming later to the Diocese of Maryland. In addition to his duties at Mt. Calvary Church, Baltimore, Fr. Kagey has served as Chaplain of the Baltimore County Alms House and at the University Hospital. He is a graduate of St. John's College, Annapolis, and the Virginia Seminary, Alexandria.

## Morton To Deliver Address

Young Republicans from all parts of Maryland converge on the State Capital, Annapolis, this weekend - May 22 and 23 for their biennial Convention. One of the highlights of the affair will be an address by the Honorable Rogers C. B. Morton, GOP Congressman from Maryland's First Congressional District, at the Convention Banquet Saturday night. Convention Chairman, Charles S. Mack announced the theme of the Convention, "The Vanguard of the GOP Return to Annapolis in '66", symbolizes the determination of these YR's to be in the forefront of the battle to win the 1966 elections.

The convention, to be held at Carvel Hall, begins Friday evening, May 21, with a reception and meetings of the convention committees. As with all conventions these formal events will be accompanied by less formal bidding by the candidates as they maneuver to obtain votes for the election the following day.

Keynoting the convention Saturday morning will be Republican State Central committee Chairman Newton I. Steers, Jr. Following reports of the Credentials and Rules Committees, the convention will consider suggested amendments to the State Federation By-Laws. It is proposed that the Federation Board be expanded to include automatic representation from every club in the state.

Following this, the Convention adjourns for lunch at which awards for "Outstanding Young Republican of the Year, and Outstanding Young Republican Club of the Year" will be made. Delegates will also hear a luncheon address by J. Glenn Beal, Jr., minority leader of the House of Delegates, and one Republican mentioned for his party's gubernatorial nomination next year.

The afternoon session will consider resolutions stating the Federation's position on a number of State issues. Shortcomings in the Tawes-Democratic Party administration are sure to be noted, especially its mis-handling of fiscal affairs and reapportionment. Final business of the convention will be the election of new YR State Officers.

Expected to attend the Saturday banquet are Maryland's representatives on the Republican National Committee, D. Eldred Rinehart of Smithburg, and Mrs. Katherine Black Massenburg of Baltimore. The federation's new officers, elected at the afternoon session, will be installed at the banquet, which will be followed by a ball.

Also on the schedule, although not a formal part of the Convention Agenda, is a meeting of the new State Young Republican Federation Board.

## Ward Serves In USS Raleigh

Seaman James W. Ward, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Ward of 216 Washington Ave., Chestertown, is currently serving aboard the amphibious transport dock USS Raleigh, engaged in the joint U. S. operation in the Dominican Republic.

U. S. forces were ordered into the strife-torn island republic after the breakdown of law and order and authorities there could no longer guarantee the safe evacuation of American citizens.

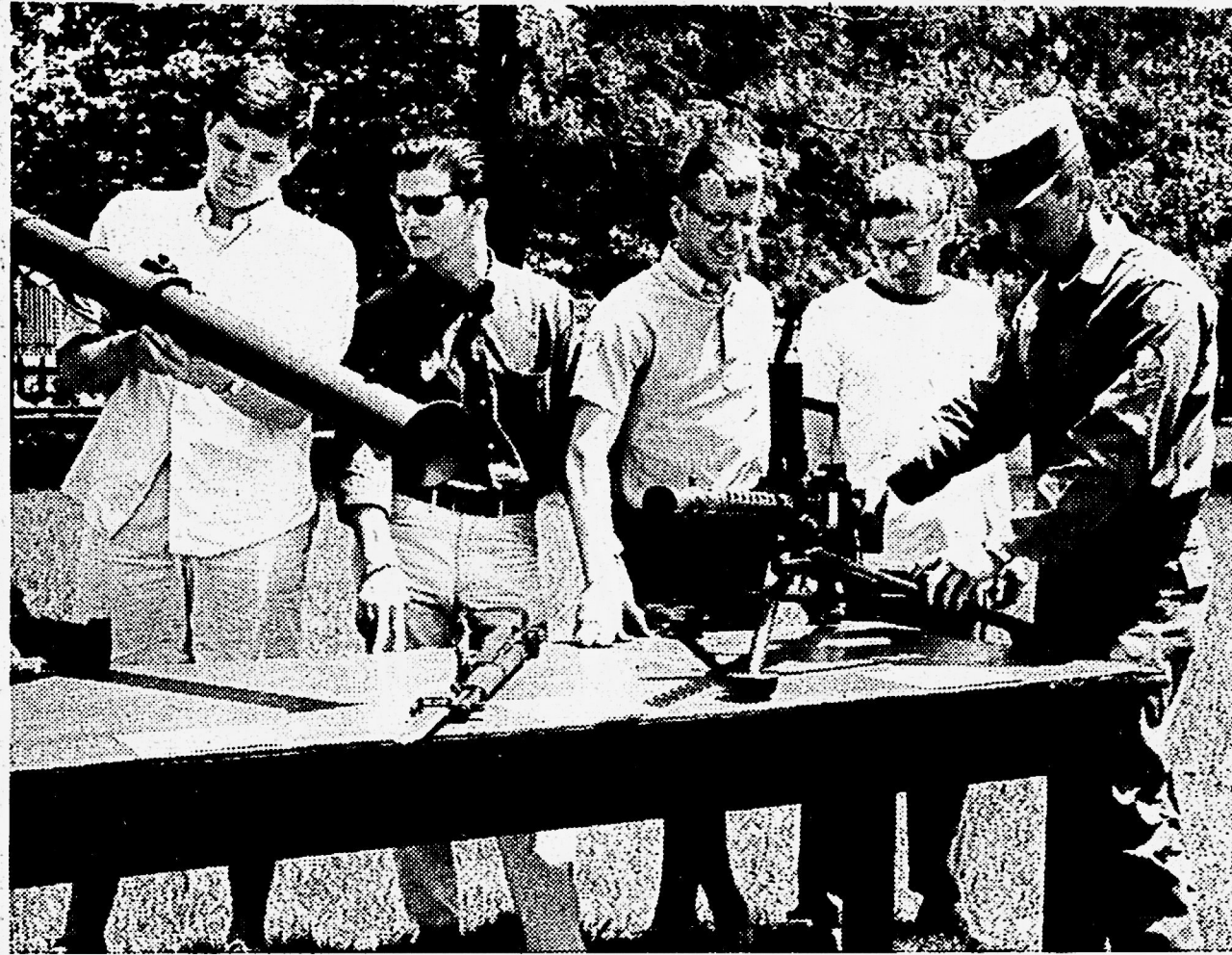
Since U. S. forces have taken part in the operation, Atlantic Fleet ships have evacuated more than 3,000 American citizens and other nationals seeking safety. The evacuees were taken to San Juan, Puerto Rico, where commercial transportation was available.

In cooperation with other U.S. Armed Forces, Navy ships and aircraft have ferried in more than 30 million pounds of food and medical supplies -- making it the largest humanitarian effort of U. S. Armed Forces since the Berlin Air Lift of 1948.

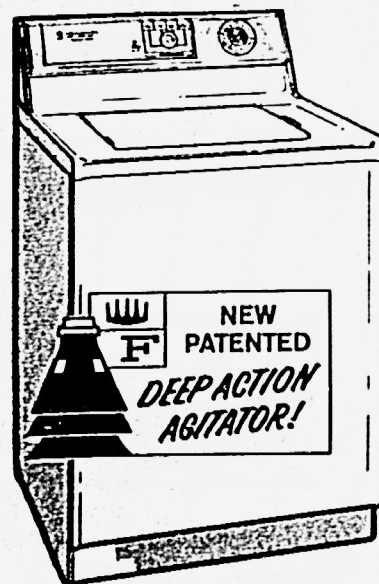

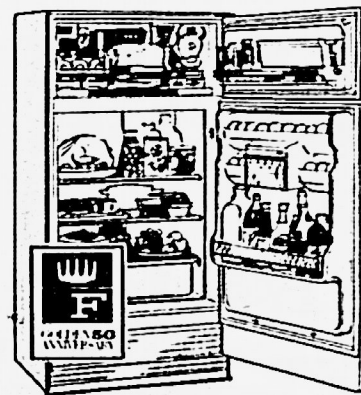
