Not in a pen or coop. Turkeys live liberty. They feel constant, and as they are not confined, they will not wander from the house a hundred yards, especially if they can have a standing place in the warm sun, protected from the south side of some elevated building, and a liberal supply of both water and pebbles within the circuit of their confined yards.

The size of a turkey working with about the force of a one-horse steam-engine, leaves no particle of the grain in a condition where it cannot be completely appropriated.

Fall Talk about Turkeys. The nature of the soil is to ramble. Their natural food is corn, beans, and herbs. Up to the middle of September, if they have any considerable range, and the flock is not too large, they will pick up a comfortable living. After that they will be fed, especially if intended for Thanksgiving.

When to Feed. At the outset, it is best to give them a little both night and morning. If largely fed only in the morning, they will be inclined to rest during the day, and might go to roost with comparatively empty crops. But if given a dinner from the house, and then with fair supper super-added, their growth will be constant and rapid.

Later, from three or four weeks before it is proposed to kill them, they cannot be fed at all times. They will be contented with their growth will be constant and rapid.
