The city of Strasbourg was surrendered to General Von Werther, commanding the besieging German army, on Monday. The capitulating force numbered 450 officers and 15 (000 means) and 17,000 men.

The Prussians are erecting batteries on the west side of Paris, and the working parties were fired upon from Fort D'Issy. From St. Cloud the besiegers opened fire on the French gunboats on the Seine, killing and wounding several sailors.

Troops continue to arrive at Tours in great numbers, and in the west and south of France the feeling of resistance to the invaders is increasing. The Prussian corvette Bertha was sunk in the Euxine, after a protracted engagement with there French vessels. The latest despatches from Paris represent the city as in every way prepared for a lengthy siege.
