

The question is often asked, When is the proper time to plant Fruit Trees, Spring or Fall? or Fall?

The most of the planting has heretofore been done in the Spring, and a large part may continue to be done at that season; yet there are some decided advantages to be gained by buying and planting fruit trees in the Fall, which we will briefly consider.

trees in the Fall, which we will briefly consider.

First. We may set it down as a rule with all deciduous trees, that they can only be moved with safety after their leaves have fallen or while they are in a domant state. The leaves are the lungs of the plant, which also draw a large amount of water from the roots and dispel it in the air. As soon as the supply is checked by removing from the earth, the evaporation through the leaves must be checked also or the plant will soon die. It is sometimes necessary to dig trees in the fall, before the leaves have all fallen by the natural process, when the remaining ones are removed by hand. Any one wishing to test the amount of water evaporated through the leaves can do so by covering a growing plant with a bell-glass or tumbler and noticing the condensation on the inside. We give special notice to this particular law of nature, because it is the direct or indirect cause of the death of most of the trees that are lost by transplanting. To make this fact understood by your readers we will give as

Rule Second. The amount of top on any tree at transplanting should always correspond to the length of roots to maintain the natural balance necessary to growth.—

It is a common practice with nursery men to send out their trees with nearly their whole top on them, when they cannot possibly send more than one-fourth their roots,

The reason is that they put out more leaves than the roots will nourish properly, and which only exhaust the tree. You may think these remarks have nothing to do especially with Fall planting, but they are esential to all planting and should be known by all. We will now briefly note some advantages to be gained by buying or planting i 1 the Fall.

First. You can have the best selection of trees and kinds that the nursery affords. rees and kinds that the nursery affords.

Second. You can plant at your leisure, or should other Fall work interfere you can in a few minutes "heal in" your trees as nursery-men say, or bury their roots and leave them well covered until next Spring, where you have though leave and and can plant

leave them well covered until next Spring, when you have them on hand and can plant out as soon as the ground thaws.

Third. Trees planted or moved in the Fall will have become itrmly settled in the ground, or if only "healed in" the roots will have "calloused" ready to grow much sooner than those freshly dug.

Any one whe has deferred sending for trees until Spring, and then had them to come to hand just in one of his busiest times will appreciate the advantage of Fall planting.

Osago Orange are also liable to be heaved up, which may be entirely pre-vented by plowing a furrow to them to be removed in Spring.

quantity of food before them constantly, so as to be sure they have enough, is very wasteful, and very bad policy; so is irregular feeding. Strict regularity as to times of feeding, quality and quantity feed, are very desirable. Twice feeding each day is better than three times; but whatever the number of times adopted, they should be every day alike, and at about the same time each day. Once giving too little—then too much—sometimes omitting a meal, then giving an extra one, or feeding at irregular times—any of these practices will detract materially from the value of the pork barrel.

"Every farmer should have a can of linseed oil and a brush on hand, and whenever he buys a new tool, he should soak it well with the oil and dry it by the fire or in the sun, before using. The wood by this treatment is toughened and strengthened, and rendered impervious to water.—Wet a new hay rake and when it dries it will begin to be loose in the joints; but if well oiled, the wet will have but slight effect. Shovels and forks are preserved from c'ecing and cracking in the top of the hundle by oiling; the wood becomes smooth as glass by use, and is far less liable to blister the land when long used. Ax and hammer handles often break where the wood enters the iron; this part particularly should be toughened with oil to secure durability. Oiling the wood in the eye of the ax will prevent its swelling and shrinking, and sometimes getting loose. The tools on a large farm cost a heavy sum of money; they should be of the most approved kinds. It is a poor economy, at the present extravagant prices of labor, to set men at work with ordinary old-fashioned implements. Laborers should be required to return the tools to the places provided for them; after using, they should be put for them; after using, they should be put away clean bright and oiled. The mold-boards of plows are apt to get rusty from ATTORNEY AT LAW, one season to another, even if sheltered; they should be brushed over with a few drops of oil when put away, and they will then remain in good order until wanted."

Saving Fodder.

In many localities the drouth has made a short crop of hay, and though of excellent quality, it will not suffice to carry the ordi-nary stock of the farm through the coming winter. All the substitutes ever used for good hay will be wanted, and it becomes farmers to make the most of them. Out and wheat straw that are often allowed to farmers to make the most of them. Our and wheat straw that are often allowed to rot upon the ground, or are used for bedding, make a very good fodder, and should be carefully stacked or stored in the barn at the time of thrashing. If cut and mixed with corn meal or wheat bran, cattle will thrive upon the feed quite as well as upon good hay. Those who have sowed corn fodder abundantly, have a good substitute for hay- Save what is left from the fall feeding. Make the most of the fodder from the corn field, which is often damaged from careless stacking. Carefully store the turnips that have been sown between the corn rows, or by themselves. It frequently happens that a dry summer is followed by abundant Fall rains, which come in season to allow us to make a large turnip crop. DRUGGIST and CHEMIST. P.
