Farm stock must now depend, in a great measure, on what is given—how it is prepared, and what quantity. These are matters that should occupy the mind of every stock owner; he should be able to estimate how much foel will be the cheapest—remembering always that there should be a variety and change from one to the other, so that the appetite may not be cloyed by too long a continuance of one variety.

Many experiments have been made in cooking food for stock; these have been conducted by men of intelligence for the purpose of acquiring facts on which to base fair calculations. Arithmetic has lent its aid; weights and measures have been used, as well with food as with the animals fed. The general result from all these facts and figures go to show that there is a saving of from twenty-five to thirty-three per cent, by properly cooking the food for farm stock, and that the best and cheapest way of doing it is by steam. The great wonder is, that with all this knowledge put into the hands of every farmer who reads an agricultural paper, the practice of steaming or in songe way cooking food for stock has not become more general. We trust that many who have not hitherto done it will commence this winter.

The article on fuel for family use has now a strong claim on our attention. It is the practice with too many to postpene preparing winter firewood until it can be no longer postponed. This is not only wrong in conomy, but in the enjoyment of life. Fires made of green wood are both slow and vexatious, Our wives and daughters will greet us with swetter smiles when retiring from our out-door labor, if we have supplied them with plenty of well prepared dry wood for cooking our meals and warming the house. What better recompense could we desire?

Such experiments are worth being made, and made carefully. In no other way can you know what you have in a cow or milk, or what you are buying. In this way also you may test the exact nutritive value of different kinds of milk from your cows—a very important matter. Farmers may derive much benefit by making a few simple experiments, now and then. They need not interfere with any of the regular duties of the farm; and nothing but a spirit of habitual indelence of thought and action will keep them from doing so. Such experiments often lead to important results, and evoke interesting and instructive facts.

The pudding is put in a greased tin pail, a cloth placed over, and the cover put on.—The pail is set in a kettle containing sufficient water to come half way up the pail; boil for two hours, or more for a large pudding. ---To Fatten Turkeys.—Shut the birds up in any place where they can pearch and roost warmly at night. Let them be fed three times per day, a good cropful each time, but not more than they will eat. They must have gravel and water. If put in good condition, three weeks or a month of this treatment should fatten them. 
