

Lambs.

[Mr. Warren Leland, who has had large experience in the matter discussed below, favors us with the following notes of his practice:]

Ladies' & Children's Dresses and Trimmings Southdown is the best breed for early lambs. Cotswold will do, but a cross with fine-wooled sheep injures the stock for lambs and mutton. Ewes from two to four years old are best, and if well kept will average one and a half lambs a year .-Bucks of the same age are the best; and Inserting and White Goods, they should never be turned with sheep

that are the least of kin, as the lambs will be less in size and less vigorous at birth. The flock should be in fine order during the summer, and the bucks put with them, say August 1st, so that the lambs may be dropyed early in January. Up to the time And Furnishing Goods of lambing, the ewes want a good, dry, warm yard, and a sheltered place at night. warm yard, and a sheltered place at night. In that way they will be protected from dogs, as a disturbance at that time by dogs, even if the ewes are not injured, is a great damage to them. They must be kept perfectly gentle, and treated with care and kindness. They should be fed good hay a small quantity of eats and corn, and a light feed of cut turnips or potatoes or beets. Just before lambing, the ewe must be put in a warm, dry stable, with windows to the south, with plenty of litter. If the weather is cold, they must be looked after often, night and day; if not, the young lamb may get chilled and die. After the first day or two, there is no danger. The root-feed must now be increased, with a liberal supply of oat-meal shorts. The lamb should be fed ou fresh, warm milk twice a day, and oftener where there are twins or the ewe is short of milk. On warm, pleasant days, let them have a run in the yard for an hour. By the time the lambs are one or two weeks old, they will begin to eat meal. If a little brown sugar is added to the meal it pays well, as it induces a great consumption, and adds very much to their flesh. Lambs cared for in this way will be ready for the butcher the last of April or the first of May; and in the large cities at that time they command a much larger price than farmers are generalty aware of. Lambs should be butchered on the farm, nicely packed in large flat market baskets. Shipping alive injures them in many cases, as they fall off rapidly. Lambs turned off so early in the season leaves the ewes to fatten during the summer, so that they will be ready for market or for early breeding the next season. In that way they will be protected from Hemp and Stair Carpets. The wool will average say from four and a half to five pounds, and, of course, sells at the market price.

The value of sheep to enrich the farm is thoroughly understood, and needs no comments from me. The consumption of mutton is on the increase in this country, but is still far behind the consumption in England. The reason for this is that until a late date the fine-wooled sheep were the only ones raised; but since the importation of the Southdowns we have as fine mutton as is produced in any country. A flock of mutton-sheep is a convenience for a farmer, as he can butcher a fat sheep or lamb at any season, and save his pork or his account at the meat market. I think a pound of mutton can be produced for two thirds the cost of a pound of beef, and in a much less time. If farmers will give sheep more attention, they will find their profits of farming very much increased.

Hearth and Honce

Hearth and Home raised nearly fifty-seven bashels of wheat on an acre of ground, and this is the way in which he did it:

in which he did it:

"In the first place, the land was thin and exhausted; had been in corn the previous year, and by the use of manure he succeeded in making seventeen bushels of that crop on the acre.

"About the last week in last October, he broke it up with a two-horse Brinly plow. Upon this he spread broaccast six two-horse wagon-loads of well-rotted stable manure, which was turned under by a cross-plowing with the same plow. Upon this he sowed broadcast two hundred and fifty pounds of dissolved bore, which was harrowed in with a two-horse revolving harrow. He then sowed one-hundred and twenty pounds of wheaton the acre, and covered it with a heavy brush, dragged over it by two mules. The clods were beat down with a maul in the absence of a roller.—This was on November 2d. In the early part of February, the wheat being then about six inches high, he sowed broadcast a top-dressing of two hundred and fifty pounds of ammoniated phosphate. Late in March, when the wheat was in the boot, he applied two hundred and fifty pounds of salt ground together. This was applied early in the morning on the dew, one-half at the end of a week.

"The grain was cut off with a common reap hook as it ripened in places, commencing on June 4th. The production of the acre was three thousand four hundred and iffeen pounds of good wheat. sons." Directions for Maxing Yeast.—All housekeepers who desire to make good bread have only to follow the recipe given below to secure the happy result. I have tested the matter and know that there is no humbug; and all the extra trouble about it is more than balanced by the superior quality of the article produced:

quality of the article produced:

Take two handfuls of hops, 3 pints of water, 6 potatoes, and boil them all until the potatoes are soft; then pare them, mash through a cullender and strain the liquid. Put it in your preserving kettle over the fire, and add 1 cup of sugar, 1 tablespoonful of salt and one of ginger; add flour enough to make it of the consistency of paste, and boil five minutes, stirring it all the time. Turn out, and when partially cool add half a pint of good yeast. Let this stand till fermentation takes place, and cool add half a pint of good years. Let this stand till fermentation takes place, and the job is done. In the winter I keep it in a stone jar in the cellar; but in the summer I dry it by mixing it with corn meal, and spreading it on the table exposed to the air, (not sun.)

A Cool Surface for Trees and Vines.

Our own experience confirms what he says, and this is perhaps the reason why all fruit-trees, when once well-established, do better in in graas than in cultivated fields.


