Saving Manure. A writer in Hearth and Home makes the

following practical suggestions on Saving Manure:

following practical suggestions on Saving Manure:

The manure heap is the farmers gold mine, and he should make the saving of manure one of the main objects in his farm economy. We are now digging drains to carry off all the water from the barns, pigpens, sheds, etc. I am determined to have a dry barn-yard. The aim is to catch all the water, and carry it off in under drains, before it can come in contact with any of the manure. Besides the inconvenience of walking about muddy premises, and the discomfort of the animals, there can be no doubt that we suffer great loss from the leaching of the manure. Where one pound of ammonia is lost from excessive fermentation and evaporation, ten pounds are lost from leaching—to say nothing of the loss of phosphates, potasi and other soluable salts. Even as capital a farmer as John Johnson says he had a leak in his barry yard for forty years, and he commenced when over eightly years old, to draw muck several miles for the purpose of absorbing and utilizing the dark colored julices that drained out of his manure heaps. This is very desirable; but it is still more desirable to the rain that falls upon it. When the yard is surrounded with sheds, and a drain is dug on the outside to catch and carry off all the water, and when all the barns are dug on the outside to catch and carry off all the water, and when all the barns are spouted, and not a drop of the water is spouted, and not a drop of the water is allowed to escape into the soil, this object can easily be attained, especially on grainfarms, where we have abundance of straw. Manure-cellars are all very well, when properly managed; but we can certainly prevent our manure from running to waste without them. I have a large basin, four or five feet deep, in the centre of my yard, into which the manure from the horse and cow-stables, nig-pens, etc., is wheeled.—

into which the manure from the horse and cow-stables, pig-pens, etc., is wheeled.—
There ought to be a tank in the centre of it, from which the liquid manure can be pumped back on to the heap when it becomes dry; and into this tank a few bushels of gypsum should be thrown every year. The gypsum, when a solution, will convert the carbonate of ammonia in the manure-heap into sulphate of ammonia, and thus prevent all danger of its escape. and thus prevent all danger of its escape y evaporation. In most barn-yards, manure ferments

In most larm-yards, manure terminate very little during our cold winters. There is not enough of it together to generate heat enough to keep out the frost. It is too often allowed to remain in heaps as too often allowed to remain in heaps as brown out from the stables and together in a compact heap, and they will gradually ferment and make excellent manure by Spring. But the heap must be kept free from excessive moisture; if to wet, it will not ferment at all.

Rats and Mice-Vermin-Proof Walls. BY A. B. ALLEN, TOM'S RIVER, N. J.

Constant complaints are made through the press of the increase of rats and nice throughout the country. The only way to get rid of them effectually is to so construct our houses, barns, and other buildings, that they cannot harbor them. To insure this, cellar bottoms should be cemented, and the walls also, unless they are solidly laid up with brick or stone and mortar.—Every basement of a house where the sleepers are close to the ground should be filled up between these to a level with their tops with cement or grouting and the boards or with cement or grouting and the boards or plank then nailed on, leaving not a hair's breadth, if possible, between the grouting and the floor. Neither rats nor mice can then get under. We built a set of stables in this way fifteen years ago, and no vermin have ever found harbor under the floor nor have grayed through it. Sometimes they have got in through a door or window, but by removing anything standing against the walls, behind which they have found temporary shelter, so that a small terrier dog could pass around, he immediately caught there are there was at once an end unt to

If the walls of a house be of wood, before lathing and plastering inside, lay a coat of mortar and small stones or cement four or five inches thick, level with the floor of of each story, between the studs and flush with them, or what, perhaps, would be better, fit in pieces of two inch hemlock plank. 
