A correspondent of the American Stock Journal from Ill., contaibutes the following: This breed of swine according to both Youatt and Martin owes its origin to a cross between the native hogs of Suffolkshire and the Berkshire and the Chinese.—Youatt further says: There are few, if any, better breed in the kingdom than the improved Suffolk." Martin says: This breed stands first." Rhem, in his Dictionary of the farm says: "Suffolk pigs are perhaps the most profitable breed in England." Col. L. G. Morris, of New York, an extensive importer and breeder of Suffolks, says: "This is one of our most valuable breeds." A correspondent of the Country Gentleman, speaking of the Suffolk, says: "In all the good qualities that constitute a perfect animal for producing the most pork of the best quality, at the least cost, the Suffolk stands unrivalled yet, by any breed in the United States. He further says:—I have slaughtered logs of this breed whose live and dressed weight differed less than a ninth." Youatt and Martin owes its origin to a

whose live and dressed weight differed less than a ninth."

The modern Suffolk as usually found in the United States, may be described as a medium sized hog, with a small head and heavy jaw, fine concaved or curved upward nose, a small, thin, erect ear, a deep broad and rather short body, covered with a thin coat of fine, smooth hair, which is invaribly white, a small tail, fine bone and smooth joints, a clear lively eye, and when not too fat, they move about with a sprightly curvinge. The sows ere prolific breeders, but rather indifferent nurses. They take on flesh with remarkable facility, and when properly managed I know of no breed of hogs that will make as many pounds of superior pork and land as the Suffolk, in the same length of time, or from a given amount of food.

The Suifolk has been widely disseminated through the country, and especially the northern portions, bordering on the great lakes, where they are quite profitable, perhaps one-fourth of the hogs of Wisconsin, Michigan and Northern Illinois have more or less Suifiolk blood in their veins. To their introduction may be attributed a large portion of the improvement of the hogs in this vicinity, during the last few years. It is not uncommon to meet nice, well fatt d. even lots of these hogs, that weigh 400 pounds each at iffeen to eighteen months old.

This shows that they are considered a first class hog in the great hog raising State of Illineis—the home of Indian corn and good hogs.

For the careful and experienced breeder, that breed to a limited extent only, and desires to market his hogs at from eight to ten months old, and avoid wintering them, the improved Suffolk perhaps has no equal And I would especially recommend them to the wool grower who only breeds a few hogs for his own use, as they are more docile, and less liable to injure his sheep than other[breeds, and make delicious pork.

Planting and Care of Trees.

the following instructions for planting trees:

Most planters are so carcless! Friends, if you want trees to thrive, plant carly, in dry, deeply plowed ground. Keep roots from sun, air and frost, burying in the ground again as soon as possible. If shriveled, bury tops and all in moist ground for ten days. Thin out and shorten in tops before planting, to balance the loss of roots in digging. Dig large holes, 3 feet across and 2 deep, or better still, plow out very deep furrrow, illling up with best soil, so that trees shall stand only as deep as in Nursery. Straighten out all roots in natural order, fill in with best fine, moist earth, and then tread down thoroughly watering well, if dry, before filling up. Then MULCH—that is cover the earth, 2 feet cach way from stems with coarse manure or straw, 6 inches deep. Always put corn or some hoed crep, NEVER grass or grain, among young trees. All trees and plants in grassy yards, and dwarf trees also must have special care. Wash bodies of apple trees in spring with strong soap suds. Kill off the caterpillars and leaf rollers.
