aired, cleaned and littered, should have, after being thoroughly groomed, their other half pale of water, and, if they be not going out, four qts. of oats; and when they have eaten these, they may have about four or five lbs. of hay in their racks, and be left dark and quiet. If they be going out early, they should have six qts. of oats at their morning feed, and no hay. If they be standing in the stable, and not be put to work until afternoon, they should be again watered, and have four qts. more at noon; and when they return at night, should be cleaned, watered, fed with oats, and have the remainder of their hay in after being thoroughly groomed, their again watered, and have four pts. mode at noon; and when they return at night, should be cleaned, watered, fed with oats, and have the remainder of their hay in their racks at night. This will be found amply sufficient to keep horses in good working condition, when no unusual lat or is expected of them, and neither extraordinary turns of speed nor feats of endurance. Half a bushel of nicely washed carrots, given a few at a time, every weel; will be found to improve the coat, to be particularly beneficial to the stomach and wind, and be very grateful to the animal; and, in weather, and in places where they can cisily be provided, a few handfuls of green clover, time meadow grass, or maize \* \* \* give a kindly alterative to the system, keep the bowels moderately oper, and please the appetite of the animal." A mash of stewed bran and oats once a week is also recommended. Such a mash is excellent after severe exertion,—and in case of unusual fatigue a quart of ale may be added. Nitre and all drugs should be avoided, and new corn should never be fed. Old corn may be used, but not more than two-thirds as much as of oats. Never feed within an hour of working time, and work slowly at first to allow the bowels to be fully evacuated. Broken-wind is caused by too sharp work when the stomach is distended by food or water; "Colic and acute initamation of the bowels from being freely watered and subjected to drafts of cold air, showers of rain, or being injudiciously bathed or washed after sharp work, when their stomachs are empty, and themselves craving a good dressing and a warm mash."

The harder the work, the more abundant and nutritious should be the feed; hay should be diminished, and oats increased to should be diminished, and oat metasted fourteen or sixteen qts., or as much as will be eaten. Water should never be given in a large quantity shortly before work, nor at all when hot or very tired. At other hours it should be supplied often and in

hours it should be supplied often and in abundance.

Youatt recommends that, whenever possible, horses should be groomed in the open air, whenever the weather is not too severe. It not only keeps the mangers and the food more cleanly, but the fresh air has a valuable invigorating effect. The curry-comb should be used very lightly, so as not to inflict any pain; and if the brush be a soft one, it will only require a little heavier hand to make it sufficiently effective.—
Even a hair cloth is sufficient with very thin-skinned horses. The head should be dressed first, and it and the cars and the roots of the mane should be made thoroughly clean, before proceeding to the body and legs. Every part must be thoroughly cleansed of dust and dandruff; and the whole hide should be thoroughly wisped all over with bunches of dry straw, until the coat is clean and glossy.

Herbert thus closes his chapter on grooming—"it requires care, dexterity, exactness and honest application of work. It cannot be procured without some expense, or relied on without the active and intelligent supervision of the master; but without it, no stablise can be in order,—no horses healthy, happy or in condition for doing the work for the performance of which they are kept."

It is not, of course, to be expected that farmers wilkeep their horses in anything like the condition of pleasure teams; but they should always have the ideal of good grooming before them, and approach it as nearly as their circumstances and their means will allow. It will undoubtedly pay for any farmer to keep his team horses thoroughly clean from head to foot, having them well groomed twice a day; but of course in a large majority of cises this could only be done at a great sacrifice in other respects, for, where but little labor is kept, other work is often of more imperative consequence. In bad weather, however, when other work is not pressing, the horses should receive extra attention, and especially when they come in from their especially when they come in from their work cold, wet and muddy, should they be made thoroughly dry and comfortable before being fed and littered down.

To Cure Carbuncles. Carbuncles have of late years become far more common than formerly. At an earlier period they were rarely seen, but now they are almost as prevalent as the ordinary boil, from which, however, they totally differ in all their characteristics. A boil is poulticed, drawn to a head, discharges itself and disappears. The carbuncle is slow in its formation, and by poultifing it with toiled fluxeed, which I believe is the best, an opening is made and a slight discharge of watery blood ensues, but it is never drawn to a "head" and never discharges like the common boil.—All the poultieing that can be given does

never discharges like the common boil.—
All the poulticing—that can be given does scarcely anything more than soften it; and many of them would not disappear for months unless the sure remedy is resorted to—laneing by a physician.

Death is sometimes produced by the carbuncle, when they are located on a vital spot, say at back of the neck on the spinal column, and sometimes produces severe lillness.

illness.

When it makes its appearance as a small hard pimple, it should be at once attacked and dispersed, which can be done by cutting it open or an application of arnica.—Some apply strong lye, &c. A lump indicating the growing of a carbuncle, is quite distinct from ordinary lumps or pimples from its particular hardness. They are caused by various conditions of the system. By a paneity as well as a superfluity of the blood. By an unhealthy state of the blood. By bruises on fleshy parts of the body, &c. Germantvan Telegraph.

To Make Bread.—Wash and pare 24 good patotoes; boil them with a large handful of salt till reduced to a fine pulp; strain through a cu lender add 3 pints of sweet milk, and when cool enough to bear your hand in it, stir in flour enough to make a thick batter; to this sponge add a coffee cup of yeast, making the sponge at night. In the morning I add siz quarts of new or sweet milk, and 3 gills of limewater, and knead it into a stiff dough. In two or three hours after kneading, it will be as light and as porous as honey comb; knead it down, and after it has again risen, mould it and put it into pans. Let it stand till it rises again; then wash the loav gover with cold water—this prevents the formation of too hard a crust—and bake it in a well heated oven. When baked, wash again, wrapping it closely in yoar bread cloth. Give this a fair trial, and I will warrant satisfaction.

warrant satisfaction. To Revive Faded Black Cloths.—Boil two or three ounces of logwood in vinegar, and when the color is extracted, drop in a piece of carbonated of iron, as large as a chestnut; let it boil. Have the cout or pantaloons well sponged with soap and hot water, laying them on a table, and brush the nap down with a sponge. Then take the dye upon the table and sponge them all over with the dye taking care to keep them smooth and to brush downward.—When completely wet with the dye, dissolve a teaspoonful of saleratus in warm water, and sponge all over with this, and it sets the color so completely that nothing rubs off. They must not be wrung or wrinkled, but carefully hung up to drain. The brownest cloth my be made a perfect black in this simple manner. ----

MEAT FOR CHILDREN.—Many persons consider meat injurious to children, but I allow my children a little beef or mutton whenever we have it for dinner, which is about four times a week; even the baby must have a piece as large as a finger, from which be pretty effectually extracts the juice. While I consider that meat in moderate quantities gives tone and vigor to the constitutian, its indiscriminate use by children should be forbidden. My mother always gave her children milk and bread for breakfast, and bread and butter for tea. I reverse that order, giving them a few I reverse that order, giving them a few warmed-up potatoes, and bread and butter for breakfast, with a bowl of milk and bread for supper. They are at table at breakfast and dinner, but not at tea.



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
