The breathing of pure air is necessary to the existence and the health of man and beast. It is comparatively lately that this has been admitted even in the management of our best stables. They have been close and foul, instead of airy, and cool, and wholesome.

If there is a loft above the stable, the If there is a loft above the stable, the ceiling should be plastered, in order to prevent the foul air from penetrating to the hay above, and injuring both its taste and wholesomeness; and no openings should be allowed above the racks, through which the hay may be thrown into them; for they will permit the foul air to ascend to the provender, and also in the act of filling the rack, and while the horse is eagerly gazing upward for his food, a grass seed may fall into the eye, and produce considerable intlamation. At other times, when the careless groom has left open the trap-door, a stream of cold air beats down on the head of the horse.

The stable with a loft over it should never be less than twelve feet high, and proper ventilation should be secured, either

never be less than twelve feet high, and proper ventilation should be secured, either by tubes carried through the roof, or by gratings close to the ceiling. The gratings or openings should be enlarged or contracted by means of a covering or shutter, so that spring, summer, and autumn, the stable may possess nearly the same temperature with the open air, and in winter a temperature of not more than ten degrees above that of the external atmosphere. above that of the external atmosphere.

A hot stable has, in the mind of the groom, been long connected with a glossy coat. The latter, it is thought, cannot be attained without the forms.

The coat, however, needs not to be so long as to be unsightly; and warm clothing even in a cool stable, will, with plenty honest grooming, keep the hair sufficiently smoothe and glossy to satisfy the most fas-tidious. The over-heated air of a close stable saves much of this grooming, and therefore the idle attendant unscrupulously sacrifices the health and safety of the horse.

If the stable is close, the air will not only be hot, but foul. The breathing of every animal contaminates it; and when in the course of the night, with every aperature stopped, it passes again and again through the lungs, the blood cannot undergo its proper and healthy change; digestion will not be so perfectly performed, and all the functions of life are injured. Let the owner of a valuable horse think of his passing twenty or twenty-two out of the owner of a valuable horse think of his passing twenty or twenty-two out of the twenty-four hours in this debilitating atmosphere! Naturo does wonders in enabling every animal to accommadate itself to the situation in which it is placed, and the horse that lives in the stable-oven suffers less from it than would scarcely be conceived possible; but he does not, and cannot, possess the power and the hardihood which he would acquire under other direumstances.

The air of the improperly close and
heated stable is still further contaminated
by the urine and dung, which rapidly ferment there, and give out stimulating and
unwholesome vapors. When a person first
enters an ill-managed stable, and especially
early in the morning he is annoyed, not
only by the heat of the confined air, but by
a pungent; smell, resembling hartshorn;
and can he be surprised at the inflammation
of the eyes, and the chronic cough, and the
disease of the lungs, by which the animal,
who has been shut up in this vitiated atmosphere, is often attacked; or if glanders and
farcy should occasionally break out in such
stables? It has been ascertained by chemical experiment that the urine of the horse
contains in it an exceedingly large quantity
of hartshorn; and not only so, but that,
influenced by the heat of a crowded stable,
and possibly by other decompositions that
are going forward at the same time, this
ammoniacal vapor begins to be rapidly
given out almost immediately after the
urine is voided.—American Stock Journal.

Soar Sups .- Soad suds, although generally decined only fit for being run off into the common sewer in the easiest manner possible, are nevertheless highly beneficial possible, are nevertheless highly beneficial vegetable feeders, as well as useful insect preventives. They should never be washed, especially by parties having gardens, as their application to the ground, whether in winter or summer, will show beneficially, not only on ordinary vegetable crops, but also on berry bushes, shrubs, border flowers, and even window pot plants; while if poured or synnged over roses, cabbages, &c., they will prevent, or at least mitigate, the mischievous doings of the green fly and caterpillar.—Ohio Ruralist.
