Phil, Wil & Balt. Railroad.—The annual report of the President and Directors of the Phil, Wil & Balt. Railroad Company, submitted at the annual meeting, on the 9th ult., have just reached us.

The receipts and expenses of the year vary but very slightly from that of the preceding year.

All depreciation in the property of the Company (P. W. & B.) has been counterbalanced by laying steel rails to replace worn out iron rails.

The stockholders were informed by a circular issued under the date of December 7th, 1870, that this Board had ordered the construction of a new road between Gray's Ferry and Chester.

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The directors furthermore state that they believe the condition and prospects of the road to be good.

During the year ending October 31st, 1870 the earnings and expenditures of the two roads owned by the company were as follows:

Total earnings of both roads, \$2,415,238.88 Total expenditures " " 1,817,621.16

CECILTON ITEMS.

The total assets of the company, including of course, road, bridges, buildings, etc., amount to \$12,577,193.25.

The total revenue of the road for 1870 was \$2,415,238.88 against a total in 1869 of \$2,565,503.24, showing a net increase of \$150,264.36.

On the New Castle and Frelightown Railroad, the passenger traffic, showed an increase in revenue of \$110,800, but the freight traffic fell off \$9,628.21 and the mill \$107,118.

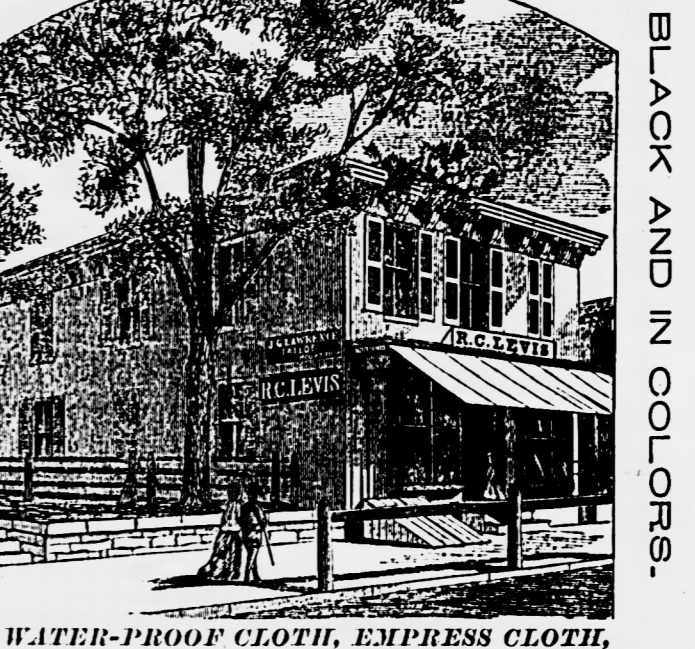
