Vhat Kinds of Apples Succeed best in Md. At this season of the year when winter At this season of the year when winter winds are howling about our dwellings it is a very good time for farmers to compare notes as to the comparative value of different kinds of farm products and there is no one perhaps where there is more room or need for improvement as in the apple crop. ISAAC ALBERTSON, Proprietor.

CASH OR PRODUCE. We all know what a convenient thing it We all know what a convenient thing it is to have plenty of nice apples to eat and hand our friends when they stop to see us yet but few have given this crop any particular attention. The most of the apples that are now being introduced had their origin in New York or New England, where the improvement of this fruit has claimed more attention than in the Southern States. ern States.

ern States.

The consequence is that as our old win-ter apples have died out they have been replaced with these Northern varieties that, replaced with these Northern varieties that, owing to our longer season, ripen long before winter sets in and have to be used or sold, to save them, long before Christmas. Our Baldwin, Roxbury Russett, King of Tompkins, R. J. Greening, and some others are of this class and can seldom be kept long into the winter. Yet we find them in market from New York plump and sound as late as May. Our apples are much larger and better though, while they last.

What we now want is more reliable kinds.

What we now want is more reliable kinds, native of this State or further south, that will hang on our trees until severe frosts come, when they may be barreled and put in the cellar with some certainty of their keeping. The past season was an unusually long one and the general complaint is that apples keep so poorly.

Will not those who have promising kinds

Will not those who have promising kinds of native apples that bear well and answer the above description, let the fact be known through your columns that they may be further tested, and oblige many lovers of good apples.

Manage so as to have two litters, one carly in the season, and the other long enough before winter to have them get well agoing. Good pigs are always in demand, and it is just as easy to get six or ten good pigs as the same number of poor runts that will never fat. And the same amount of food fed to a good pig will make twice as much meat as to the other. The only difference in expense is the first cost of the boar or sow, and one litter of pigs will pay all the difference in expense between a pure bred 'Chester, Suffolk, or Berkshire, and the lank specimen ordinarily used in breeding.

the lank specimen ordinarily discums the lank specimen.

What is the best breed? is a question often asked; but there are several so good that it is difficult to answer. Where the "Chester White" is known, no other breed can compete with it. It is, according to our notion, nearer perfection as a hog than has before ever been arrived at. Its outline is beautiful, its disposition gentle, its habits quiet and contented—not disposed to roam and fret, so that the food it consumes goes to the formation of flosh, and is not spent in running after mischief. It is not a gross feeder, but, like all other animals, requires its food at regular intervals. This care and attention is never lost on it. There is no other breed onjoys better health. If kept and properly cared for until twolve or fifteen months old, it will yield from five to seven hundred pounds of pork. What other animal will yield so much in so short a time, from so small a beginning, with such a small outlay of capital?

The Berkshires are a smaller breed, fat

such a small outlay of capital?

The Berkshires are a smaller breed, fatten well in proportion to their food, and are excellent breeders. No one can go amiss in purchasing a Berkshire. The Suffolks, and the improved Prince Albert Suffolk especially, are good. The Essex, Cheshire, Leicester, and Polands are much better than the "no breed." The China is lit only for crossing with some of the large coarse breeds. Such a cross improves the China in size and the larger breeds in quality.

But in buying a sow or boar for breeding, do not be satisfied with its being called a Chester, or Suffolk, or Berkshire, (unless you buy of some responsible breeder,) but see for yourself that the animal has the good points of the breed.

Breeding.—The sow goos from fifteen to seventeen weeks with pigs. At the end of the fourteenth week she should be watched considerably, and if she appears to be suffering, restless, wandering about collecting straw, etc., coax her into a sty by herself, where you can take care of her and the pigs. This sty should have cleats nailed on the sides a foot from the floor, under which the pigs can escape, or else the sow on the sides a foot from the floor, under which the pigs can escape, or elso the sow may lie on them. It is not best to interfore to take away the pigs unless she seems likely to crush them, but it is well to be where you can watch her without being seen yourself. When the farrowing is over and the after-birth is dropped remove it at once, for if she cats it she will be likely to eat her pigs also. If she should commence to eat her pigs, give her a half pint of spirits and make her drunk. If she is not too fat she will manage without lying on her pigs. For a week or two before farrowing she should be fed on cooked meal and milk, and this should be continued for some time after. If a farmer Hats & Caps, Boots & Shoes. cooked meal and milk, and this should be coutinued for some time after. If a farmer has a few lengths of adjustible fence always about his premises he will find it handy on many occasions. He can fence in a few rods of grass for pigs, calves, or lambs, as required. After ten or twelve days the pigs can be let out with the sow. Frequent feeding is better for the sow than large feeds. If she is weakly, or seems to have too many pigs for her milk, make a mash of whey and bran, or skim milk, meal and bran, and teach the pigs to eat as soon as possible.

AMERICAN STOCK JOURNAL, and continue such use of the harrow as often as once a week, till the plants are ten or twelve inches high. Such harrowing supersedes the necessity of hoeing corn altogether, and so fully cleans out the weeds and lets in the air and moisture about the plants. I would not give the best of hands their board to hoe corn for me till after the tap-roots appear. When the harrows are laid aside, a cultivator should be used till the time for the braces near the top of the ground to put out. The multitude of roots which proceed from such braces should not be disturbed. If then many weeds are near the plants, it may be profitable to lift them by the hands, potato hook or other wise.

I have never known a corn-plant to be materially injured in my corn fields by thus

naterially injured in my corn fields by thus harrowing. Several of my neighbors, knowing of my success, have attempted to do the like, but speedily laid by their harrows. Such use of the harrow will prove fatal to the crop, unless the seed be planted so deep that the harrow-teeth will not reach the roots that spread horizontally from the seed.

the roots that spread horizontally from the seed.

When I began this I intended to stop here, but I can scarcely refrain from adding, that many have partially failed in planting in drills, as well as by planting in hills, by allowing twice as many plants in a given space as can be profitable.

in a given space as can be profitable.

My rows of corn being four feet apart, and the variety of corn the large Dent, the single plants sixteen inches apart, will yield a much larger quantity of sound corn, and be out of the reach of frosts weeks sooner, than if but eight inches asunder. Other varieties may rightly vary in the rows from twelve inches down to eight inches.

Other things being equal, I am of the opinion that a cultivator can grow one-fifth or even one-fourth more when planted in drills than in hills.
