

HOW THE DIAMOND MINERS WORK.

"Most of the miners work in this man ner: They first dig the gravel to the bed or to the clay (generally from six inches to three feet in depth,) then with a meal sifter they sift the dirt and throw out all large siones. The middling dirt, or pebbles, they cart to the Vaal river, about, on an average, 500 yards from the mine, and there wash it in a California gold cradle; they then lay the washed pepples on a table, and carefully sort a handful at a time with a scraper; by this means they get through about two cart-loads of sifted 'cascalho' a day. Some carry the water up to the mine, and after the dry sifting of the dirt, they dip the sieve in the water and wash the

Pope Plus the Ninth.

But when the the means that exist for feeding the cattle Revolution of 1848 burst out in Europe, which it is necessary to use in "trucking" the Roman people rose against their ruler, and Pius IX., after remaining a prisoner necessary to drive the oxen through thick for some time in his palace, fled in disguise to Gaeta. In 1849 a French army marched upon Rome and restored the Pope to his throne. All his liberal tendency had disappeared under his terror of republican iolence, and, aided by the great Catholic Powers, he entered on a reactionary course. In 1860, during the Garibaldian invasion, the Pope lost the greater part of his dominons, which were annexed to the new kinglom of Italy.

Among other leading incidents of the reign of Pope Pius IX. may be mentioned, -the re-establishment of the Roman Catholic hierarchy in England; the authorita-Immaculate Conception; the promulgation of the Encyclical Letter and the Syllabus of Errors, denouncing the whole fabric of modern civilization; and the assemblage of the great (Ecumenical Council for the purpose of declaring the personal Infallibility of the Pope. But the greatest event of all was yet to come. Pope Pius IX. had nearly completed his twenty-five years of sovereignty—the fated term which no Pope has ever yet exceeded-when his temporal power came to an end. The immense mportance of this Revolution can hardly be realized at the present time, when the attention of the world is engaged in watching the desperate struggle between France and Germany. Hereafter, when that strife is hushed, the true significance of the change which has recently come over the Seven-hilled City will be more fully appreciated.

Numerous events had gradually been preparing the way for this signal catastrophe. Eleven years ago Italy was still, according to Prince Metternich's famous phrase, "merely a geographical expression." Since then, aided by the genius o Cavour, the gallantry of the little Piedmontese kingdom, the enterprise of Garibaldi, and last, but not least, the blood and treasure of France, she has been welded into unity. For a long time, however, the Patrimony of St. Peter held out, like another Strasbourg. But by degrees the brisk engagement took place before an entry was effected. The hearts of the Romans, however, were with the besiegers. everywhere the green, red, and white banner of Italy was displayed, and the plebiscitum which succeeded showed an almost unanimous desire for Italian unity. Mahogany Cutting in Honduras. Mr. E. G. Squier, in his "Honduras Descriptive, Historical, and Statistical," "Of all occupations known to man, that When the cutter has fixed upon the valley the wood. To these points it is often and untracked forests, and to carry the chains and trucks, by means of small boats against strong currents, or over shallows and rapids, which are only surmounted with infinite labor. The site once definitely fixed upon, the next step is to erect temporary dwellings for the men-a task of no great difficulty, as the only requisite is protection from the sun and rains, which is effected by a roof thatched with long grass from the swamps, or with "cahoon" leaves,

"The laborers are divided into gangs or companies of from twenty to fifty each, under the direction of a leader styled 'a captain,' who directs the men in his company, assigns them their daily tasks, and adds to or deducts from their wages in proportion as they accomplish more or less than what is supposed to be a just day's work. Each gang has also one person con-nected with it, who is called a hunter, whose duty it is to search the 'bush' for trees proper to be cut. His work, therefore, commences somewhat earlier than that of the others, and as it involves activity and intelligence, he is paid much higher wages than the mere cutters. His first movement is to cut his way through the thickest of the woods to some elevated sitnation, where he climbs the tallest trees he finds, from which he minutely surveys

the surronding country. "Around Belize the mahogany-cutters are chiefly negroes, descendants of the slaves who were formerly employed there. But in Honduras they are principally Caribs, who, in activity and strength, are said to excel the negroes: they are also more intelligent, and require less care and superintendence. Many of them go annually to Belize, and hire themselves for the season, returning to their homes at its
