FARM AND HOUSEHOLD.

Butter Making in Cecil County. In reply to a request asking Mr. Lloyd Balderson for a statement of his experience in the dairy business, we have received the following statement and suggestions, the result of several years' experience in the dairy business, which make them valuable, coming from one who has proved by sure tests the suggestions and figures he advances:

vances:

A statement for a year would be more satisfactory, than for a single week, but we have been so much involved in raising heifers for subsequent dairy cows, that we have hardly the data for a whole year's result, especially in butter making. In connection with this business it may be proper to give some collateral reflections. It seems that grain farming, making grain the staple crop for market, is not adopted to Cecil county; that farmers are impoverishing their lands and themselves by persisting in this course of business. I am fully of the opinion that if farmers would improve in their circumstances, some change must be made; but it is by no means obvious that it would be prudent for ell to enclark in the production of milk. impreve in their circumstances, some change must be made; but it is by no means obvious that it would be prudent for all to embark in the production of milk, butter or cheese. Any business, to be successful, must be done well, and there is reason to believe that a large majority of the farmers of Cecil county have not about them the elements of success, in this employment. I do not say they are unattainable, but the difficulties may be such, in many cases, that the attempt to establish a regular market dairy would be highly imprudent. But such farmers need not despond unless their soil is hopelessly sterile. Besides dairy work there are many things to which a farmer may turn his attention, that will yield more profit than corn or wheat. It were, perhaps, futile to precribe what these should be. Every farmer must decide for himself what his soil will produce, his means cultivate, and his market call for. The level counties below us along the bays, have their peach orchards; Now Jersey its patches of melons and cablages; Montgomery county, its dairies.

In each branch of business there is suc-In each branch of business there is suc-

cess, comfort and wealth. Surely in our county with great markets around us and county with great markets around us and such ample means of transportation, there can be little cause for failure or despondency, except it be on some of our barren tracts. A short preliminary essay will not admit of going into particulars. Should we recommend the culture of potatoes, of broomcorn, beans or onions, the rearing of stock, the production of fruits, the keeping of sheep, or of cows, each of them to state the particulars upon which success depends would require a short essay.—Whatever special crops any one may undertake, a course of farming would hardly be complete and self-sustaining without a paying stock of some kind of animals. Manure is continually wanted, and hay, grain, and surplus or refuse roots or vegetables should surplus or refuse roots or vegetables should over find an economical and profitable con-sumption at the stables.

whose experience and opinions would be valuable to the farming community, and all who will favor us with an article, or articles, on the subject, will place us under obligations to them. It will be seen that in the above estimate

no account is taken of the calves and stock raised from the dairy, which if properly managed, are worth as much as other pro duce. The profit from this source might be vastly increased by several farmers combining and purchasing a herd book Jersey bull. This would insure a pure blooded animal, and the value of the heifers would be greatly enhanced as dairy stock. It is here that co-operation among farmers would tell to their advantage incalculably.

A Superior Fertilizer.

Every farmer should contrive in every possible way to increase the amount of his lertilizing material from year to year. The following we believe, in some respects, the most valuable recipe in existence for an artificial fertilizer for all the cereal grains most valuable recipe in existence for an artificial fertilizer for all the cercal grains and root crops. With one barrel of pure, finely ground bone, mix a barrel of good wood ashes; during the mixing add, gradually, about three pailfuls of water. The heap may be made up on the floor of an out-building, or upon the barn floor; and, by the use of a hoe, the bone and ashes must be thoroughly blended together.—The water added is just sufficient to liberate the caustic alkalies, potash and soda, and these react upon the gelatine of the bone, dissolving the little atoms, forming a kind of soap, and fitting it for plant food. In this way the most valuable constituents of bone can be immediately made available, and the addition of potash and soda aids in the formation of a fertilizer of inestimable value. The water added is not sufficient to make a pasty mass, difficult to dry, but is enough to liberate the strong alkalies from the ashes. This preparation is so clearly convenient and useful, every farmer should prepare as much as possible for his crops during the coming season. A little placed in a hill of corn will work wonders. It is excellent for garden vegetables, and for all kinds of roots. It must be used in small quantities, or in about the be used in small quantities, or in about the same way as the so-called super-phosphates.

A barrel of this mixture is worth two of A barrel of this mixture is worth two of any of the commercial fertilizers, and the cost will be about half as much. If the bone-meal and ashes are very dry, four paidfuls of water may be required; but care must exercised not to have it inconveniently moist. It will be ready for use in a week after it is made. Pure, raw, finely-ground bone and the best of ashes should be employed.—Deits's Farm Journal. BREEDING Sows.-1. buttermilk proper food &c. O. V. Ans.-We do not think

food &c. O. V. Ans.—We do not think that buttermilk, or any other food usually given to swine, and in moderate quantities, will cause a sow to cast her pigs. The danger is, that breeding sows do not get a sufficient variety of food. During the whole time of gestation three things ought to be carefully observed; and when they have been we have never known a sow to cast her young. First, access to the ground and sufficient space to root about in it.—Second, some kind of animal food, least once each week, such as butchers's scraps, bits of fresh meat of any kind, with a little salt in the swill; and Thirdly, adry and roomy bed. When these conditions are observed, the sow will do well.
