As the famous "Oyser Navy', made itself conspicuous by sundry captures of decoy ducks, sink boats, etc., from the Havre de Grace duckers last winter, the public would doubtless like to know some-thing of its history. This famous "navy" dates its existence from 1867, a law having been passed by that Democratic Legislature, creating this formidable fleet. For construction, arming, salaries, etc., the cost to the State in 1868 was \$21,321.01. An enterprise so extensive-one small steamer-could not be completed in a single year, and hence we find in the next year's report to the Legislature for balance for "constructing and arming steamer," under an act of 1868, of \$12,985.56, with the further addition to the expenditure for the "navy" that year, composed of salary and other items, of \$15,201.21, making an aggregate expense to the State of \$28,186.80.
