The strongest hold of our Democratic friends, after the negro, has always been to charge the Republican party with extravagance in public expenditures. These charges, it will be remembered, were made with great vehemence and confidence, but nothing like proof was ever presented to the speakers and newspapers that made them. Political excitement, as far as our State is concerned, having become to use a mercantile phrase, "flat," we propose to introduce a few figures, from time to time, into our columns to show which party is justly chargeable with this propensity for scattering the public revenues and taxing the people.

We will first take up the Civil List, and cite some of the leading disbursements, comparing the Republican management of the State of Maryland in 1860, and the Democratic Administration of 1870.

But one item in this list remains unchanged, and every other, except the Commissioner of the Land Office, has been considerably increased. The Democratic, or Copperhead party—more properly speaking—when they assumed control of the State, made an onslaught upon the system of free schools, which had been established by the Republican party, and which was pronounced one of the best in the country, by those most conversant with the free school systems of the States. In that battle against public education, the office of Superintendent of Education, was abolished, but the salary of that officer, \$3,500, was not saved to the State. Another office, created by the Democrats, termed Superintendent of Labor and Agriculture, with a salary of \$2,500, and which, by the office's own showing, in his Report to the Governor and Legislature, at its last session, was about as useful to the State, as that famous fifth wheel to a coach.

The Immigration Fund was a creation of 1868, the object of which was to supply foreign farm labor and exclude the colored laborers, because they were disposed to work contrary to the wishes of their former masters. This little experiment, which the Agent pronounced a complete failure, received an appropriation of \$5,000 by the last Legislature.

The Confederate Memorial Association at Frederick, has an additional appropriation of \$1500; the former Legislature, which created these associations, appropriated \$5,000 for the Point Lookout Cemetery. This money was expended in fitting up and "decorating" cemeteries, into which the bones of the Rebel dead were gathered from the battle-fields of Antietam, South Mountain and other adjacent places, and Rebel prisoners who died at Point Lookout. As soon as the Rebel party of Maryland got into power in the State, they commenced using the public money to fit up and decorate cemeteries and remove the bones of those silent figures point like the finger of fate to the party guilty of squandering the public money, and heaping mountains of taxation and debt upon the people of the State; which condition of affairs today is repelling capital and labor from the borders, and placing half of the estate in the hands of absentee trustees for public sale, as the teeming columns of the country papers of the State, week after week, abundantly testify.

Some time ago Mrs. Pomeroy, wife of the somewhat notorious "Brick" Pomeroy, engaged the services of General Butler as a counsel for the purpose of procuring a divorce from her husband. As soon as "Brick" heard that his wife had engaged Gen. Butler, he instructed his lawyer to endeavor to make a compromise. Pomeroy's lawyer went to Butler to ascertain whether a compromise could be effected. After consulting his client, Butler replied that it could, provided Pomeroy would pay his wife twenty thousand dollars, with all the lands of the State. Pomeroy, in the terms, and he is settled, Mrs. Pomeroy resuming her maiden name.

The number of ex-rebels in Congress far exceeds the number of "carpet-bag representatives of the South." Of the twenty-two Southern Senators, only nine are of Northern birth, and one of these is a Democrat. Of the fifty-nine Southern Representatives, forty-one are natives of that section, and only nine Northern; and of this number of Southern Representatives twenty-eight are ex-officials of the Confederacy. This statement effectually shows that the South has more traitors in Congress in proportion than many of the Western States.

On Monday went into effect the act of Congress repealing all special taxes, licenses, etc., except on distilled spirits, malt liquors and tobacco. The reduction of the receipts of internal revenue by these changes will amount to between thirty and forty millions of dollars. And thus the Republican party, in pursuing its policy of economy, is able to lift the burdens of taxation from off the people and at the same time reduce the public debt nearly \$10,000,000 per month.

The Communists still hold out at Paris and are going slowly on. The Prussians have given notice that they will interfere to establish order soon, if the Government fails to put down the Paris insurgents, when, it is reported, a Regency under the Empress will be established.

**DELAWARE.**
