FARM AND HOUSEHOLD. Premium Corn Crop in Pennsylvania

The Brandywine Farmers' Club of Chester county, Pa., has awarded to David II. Bronson, of Guthrieville, the premium for the best four acres of Indian corn, his crop averaging 127 bushels and 33 pounds per acre. The height of the stalks varied from 13 to 16 feet, many measuring seven inches in circumference. In his statement to the club, Mr. Bronson said that last fall and spring he applied 100 wagon loads of unleached livery and barn-yard manure, broadcast, on 25 acres of clover and timothy sward, 50 loads of which were hauled a distance of three miles, all furrowed down in The subscriber has just erected at his farm, near the sity, the most improved machinery for making RONN bUST, and is now ready to fill orders for any quantity, which will be delivered at the shortest notice.

No charge for bags: thoroughly pulverizing the soil, he marked out rows one way 3½ feet apart, dropping the corn by hand, two grains, 15 to 18 inches apart, and applied to each hill a handfull of hen manure, ashes, and plaster, of equal parts, covering with hoe, May 10th. On 12 acres of the 25 cultivated, 500 bushels of lime were applied and cultivated in; the remaining 13 acres had previously been limed on the sod. In regard to the use of fertilizers Mr. Bronson remarked:

"Observation has taught me to believe "Observation has taught me to believe that farmers who have almost abandoned the use of lime, and substituted many of the various so-called fertilizers, are impor-

the various so-called fertilizers, are impoverishing their lands, and have been deprived of their hard carnings, having been induced to purchase by the ingenuity of manufacturers, producing numerous testimonials of their magic results.

"If we were entirely dependent upon the patent manures in the market, our land would in time become almost as barren as that of the great Sahara, and our children would be crying for bread. Twenty-five years back, Brandywine and her sister town-ships were illuminated almost nightly by the light from some lime kiln in the neighborhood; to-day we find them converted into ice-houses, and the trade entirely in the hands of the few who make it a speverted into ico-houses, and the trade entirely in the hands of the few who make it a special business. When we apply lime and barn-yard manure, we need no stakes to mark the result. Their application has long since ceased to be an experiment—the effects are evident. Raw-bone, beyond doubt, is an excellent fertilizer; yet its market value is such that the farmer cannot affort to apply it in quantities necessary for a permanent substitute for lime. An not affort to apply it in quantities necessary for a permanent substitute for lime. An old horse, after having faithfully served the will of his master and paid the debt of nature, is more valuable, properly managed, than one ton of most of the fertilizers in the market. The deposits in the hennery are valuable when fixed in equal parts with plaster and applied to corn, or wheat, broadcast. Good shelter for our barn-yards is also one of the very best investments a

also one of the very best investments a farmer can make; manure exposed to the sun and drenching rains in the barn-yard is almost worthless, the substance of fertilizing properties having long since pol-luted some rivulet, and passed into the Mr. Isaac L. Sahler, of West Brandywine, raised on one acre 131 bushels and 26 pounds of corn, allowing 70 pounds of ears to the bushel.

Remedy for Peach Tree Borers.

Having read the circular of Messrs. Buchan & Co., of New York, describing the effects of their Carbolic Soap as an insect destroyer, I sent and procured a lot of that article for experiment, and after two years of trial, I feel quite safe in recommending its use as the cheapest and best method yet found for the prevention of injury by the peach-borer. (I presume it will prove equally effective for the appleborer, but I have not as yet tried it for that purpose.) My method of using this remedy is as follows: Take a five-pound can of this soap (costing only \$2.) and turn it into a barrel one-third full of hot water; stir it occasionally, and let stand a few into a barrel one-third full of hot water; stir it occasionally, and let stand a few hours, or over night, for the soap to dissolve: then fill up the barrel with cold water—or I sometimes uso soapsuds from the kitchen for this purpose. The liquid is now fit for use. Is of a milky appearance, and pungent but not offensive odor. It is too strong for using on plants, but will not hurt the bark or wood of troes.—Applied with a paint-brush around the base of the trees, taking care to have the liquid enter all crevices, it immediately destroys all the insect-eggs that have been liquid enter all crevices, it immediately destroys all the insect-eggs that have been deposited, and any young worms which have not penetrated farther than the bark; and I believe that for some weeks, at least, unless heavy rains occur, the odor prevents the moths from depositing eggs. I at first thought that, for this purpose, a second application of the liquid might be necessary; but my experience the past season has convinced me that one application in July, or

vinced me that one application in July, or early in August, is sufficient.

The barrel of liquid described is enough for a thousand trees of bearing size, and an active lad can do the work, in two days, if the orchard is in fair condition. But if many weeds are in the way, it will be necessary to the suffice around the many weeds are in the way, it will be necessary to first clear the surface around the stems of the trees with a hoe. The average expense of this remedy is not over five dollars per year for a thousand trees, or less than one-fourth that of the old method of killing the worms by hand (after they had done much mischief;) and then, too, the new method is vastly more effective.

American Agriculturist. SELECTION OF DAIRY COWS .- The grades of Durham and other stock, never excelling. As a rule, the progeny of these extra milkers become the best cows; and every helfer ealf from such should be raised, heifer calf from such should be raised, except it fail to carry the prevailing mark indicating a good milker. This mark is the upward growth of the hair on the inside of the thighs of the calf from immediately behind the udder, as high as the hair goes. If it be found running up in a smooth, unbroken column, all other things being equal, with good caro and continued thrifty growth, there will scarcely be a failure.— But whatever extraordinary qualities the cow may possess, unless this mark is found on the calf, it is not worth raising for a dairy cow. There are several other signs, or conditions, indicative of valuable milking qualities, some of which attend the first described. Smooth and fair-sized teats; a large and long milk vein; slim neck; and a large and long milk vein; slim neck; and sometimes six teats; a yellow skin appar-ent about the eyes and nose, and other bare spots, are indications of rich milk, and one of the characteristics of a good cow.

he has two hundred acres of land that has been dressed with lime at the rate of 100 to 150 bushels per acre. This puts it into paying condition, but not much more.—And he wants to bring it into a high state of cultivation, and he cannot possibly make barn-yard manure enough for this purpose, and he asks if it will pay to use pure bonedust at \$50 per ton. With ordinary farm crops I do not think it will. It would pay better on turnips and mangel wurzel than any other crop, and if we could get it for about \$25 per ton, it would be a profitable manure for turnips, and, probably, for o'd grass-land in the dairy districts. I think Mr. Cook can make manure much cheaper than he can buy it. Land that has received such a liberal drossing of lime ought to produce capital crops of clover. And the clover may be fed out on the farm in conjunction with bran and oil-cake, and thus the richest of manure would be obtained. the richest of manure would be obtained. It is much more economical to buy bran and oil-cake than to buy bone-dust at \$50

The present condition of the artificial The present condition of the artificial manure-market in this country is eminently unsatisfactory to the farmer. The manures are mostly poor in quality and very high in price.—American Agriculturist.

EARLY CHICKENS .- The season of the EARLY CHICKENS.—The season of the year has now fully arrived when breeders ought to have their stock mated and placed in their breeding pen, and whenever a hen shows signs of incubation, no time should be lost in placing eggs under her. The early hatched chickens has many advantages over those of later birth; it should be borne in mind that it is in early chickenhood the frame is made that will hereafter place it in the rank of the large birds of its breed. And although feeding has much to do in the production of size and maturity, other things being equal, the early chicken is sure to be the best. It behooves, breeders, then, who wish to excel in this respect, to produce early chickens, although at the cost of considerably more care and attention than is necessary in the raising of those at a later period in the season. Poultry Chronicle.


