Royal Smith, of Millington, Mass., gives his experience in potato raising, in a recent number of the Germantown Telegraph.

FARM AND HOUSEHOLD.

Potato Culture.

I propose in this paper to state some of my experience and ideas in regard to grow-ing potatoes.

And here I will say that I have tried planting very large potatoes, those of mid-dling size, those that are still smaller, and those of the *least size* in the bin, not bigger

to circumstances from this and in the same to circumstances from this and in the same proportion for a larger or smaller heap. The muck should be dug out of the swamp the season previous and have the benefit of freezing over winter.

These materials should be well mixed.

These materials should be well mixed together carly in the spring, and go through the heating process, and carefully turned over and mixed the second time about a week before using. If I want to economize it I make it go as far as possible, and put it in the hill at the time of planting; if the land is very lean I\*put a common barnshovel moderately full to each hill. If the land is in better condition half that quantity will do. If I have plenty of compost to spare I spread it on the surface of the field after plowing the ground, and work it into the soil with the harrow, anywhere along from fifteen to twenty ox-carl loads to the acre or more, according to the coninto the soil with the harrow, anywhere along from fifteen to twenty ox-cart loads to the acre or more, according to the condition of the soil and the size of the manure heap. In taking this last course I put in each hill a little plaster and ashes at the time of planting; and it will often pay well to apply in both methods a little plaster and ashes to each hill at the time of the first hoeing, which should be done as soon as the potato plants are fairly out of the ground. I then keep the ground clear of weeds, and finish with a second hoeing, raising the hills a trifle above the level of the surrounding surface of the field.

I have, Mr. Editor, been very successful in growing potatoes by this method for a number of years. The vital and cropgrowing forces in the soil and compost, and here described readily unite in a chemical way and work in harmony together to produce a satisfactory crop of fine, large, smooth and mealy potatoes.

How I Wash my Dishes.

Of course, I make sure before breakfast or dinner that there is plenty of water in the boiler, and also in the tea-kettle. After General Commissiom Merchant, the boiler, and also in the teasecture. After the table is cleared, the table cloth brushed off and neatly folded away, and the dining-room disposed of, I proceed with my dishes. First, I take my large dish-pan, put into it a piece of soap, and pour over the soap three or four dipperfuls of hot water from the boiler. Then I add two or three dip-perfuls of cold rain-water. Then my dishcloth. The water should now be so cool as not to turn the hands red when put into it. Take the dish-cloth and rub from the is not to turn the hands red when put into it. Take the dish-eloth and rub from the soap the melted surface, and put the remainder away. Wash a dish at a time and pass it to another pan; a milk-pan is generally used. When all are done, or the pan is full, take the tea-kettle and pour over enough hot water to thoroughly rinse and heat them. Now take them from to water, one at a time, and place them bottom-side up upon a tray or pan to drain.—
If they have been properly washed, this hot rinsing water will run off or evaporate in a minute, leaving the dishes nearly dry. However, they should now be wiped with a clean, dry towel, and put away. Dishes must be washed in soft water. Especially is this necessary where soap is used. And soap is really indispensable in washing dishes properly. The dishes should be seraped free from grease, crumbs, bones, etc., before commencing to wash them. A Clover, Timothy and Flax Seeds. scraped free from grease, cruims, bones, ctc., before commencing to wash them. A neat housekeeper will have the same dish cloth in use until it is worn out, when it should be put into the rag bag. Never allow the dish-cloth to be used for anything else but washing dishes. American Agriculturist.

MANURING.—Much of the value of barnyard manure is lost by long keeping. Many farmers suppose manure to be improved by remaining in the heap a year, to be hauled out at leisure. No greater mistake than this could be made. If manure is hauled out during the winter, as it accumulates, not allowing it to lie in the heap long enough to heat and burn, it will be much more valuable than when subjected to this damaging process. By an early distribution upon the land much of the liquid portion is preserved, all of which, with the tion upon the land much of the liquid por-tion is preserved, all of which, with the ammonia, (and the latter is perhaps the most valuable component in any manure,) may be considered lost.

taken from our lands, must, in the very nature of things take valuable constituents from all tilled lands, the question of replac-ing this constant drain should receive more attention than is generally accorded to it. *Loca Homestead*.

To Boil Ham.—The ham should be nicely washed in warm water and put into cold water. Allow a quarter of an hour to cach pound of ham. When sufficiently boiled, remove it from the water and place it in a baking-pan; remove the rind, and roast or bake one hour in a quick oven, dredging it frequently with a mixture of finely-powdered and sifted bread-crumbs and flour, in the proportion of one part of flour to three of bread-crumbs. If not scorched, it will look finely upon the table. The flour prevents the crust of crumbs from scattering over the ham when cut. To Boil, HAM .- The ham should b

Those that do not need it will not touch it. Dairymen would do well to feed this article to cows, since they are called upon to supply a considerable quantity in their milk and in the production of their young. We have never seen or heard of an ox picking up and trying to chew a refuse bone whilst with milel cows it was quite common.—American Stock Journal.
