know it. He never attacks the miner or herder, except at the greatest disadvantage to the latter, or within a mile or two of the Government post, where he knows, on the first alarm, the cavalry will be started in pursuit of the miners and herders, who can scalp as fast as Indians.

One of them talked to me thus:—" Me no fear blue-coat; me no fear buffalo-sol-diers, (meaning the 15th Amendment;) me diers, (meaning the 15th Amendment;) me feard of miner and cattle-men; he scalp Injun; he kill Injun squaw and pappooses." In fact, the Indian never goes on the war path, while his squaws and children are in reach of danger, and I believe the only good the cavalry does, is to bring back the

quaws and pappooses, when the Indian ends them away, that he may be free-footed to do as he pleases, without their encumorance.
I am asked, time and time again, "What can a poor man do in the West?" West, as everywhere else, capital makes capital. Starting from Elkton, \$62.50, for full age; half price for children over five; under, free. Five dollars a head will boar

age; hall price for children over five; under, free. Five dollars a head will boar all expenses. A small basket of provisions put up before starting, will save even this expense. Now, what can he do after getting there? Common labor is \$2.50 per day—farming, working in the irrigating districts, or any labor usually done in a community. Carpenters get \$4; head or boss carpenters from \$5 to \$10 per day.—Every kind of labor is in great demand.—Under the law, as soon as he gets in the Territory, he can take up 160 acres of land, pays \$9 down, and \$9 at the end of five years. He has one year before he need touch it: at the end of the year, he would have to put up a small house, as he has to swear that he has slept over night on the claim once in six months for five years.—Rents and wages are high; lumber is cheaper than in Cecil, but rougher. A man should be able to put up his own shanty, as the work is more than the material.
