

We have long thought that not nearly We have long thought that not nearly so much attention was paid to the cultivation of the parsnip as its value would seem to demand. It is true the crop requires careful cultivation, and in the first weeding requires considerable labor; but then no root crop is more abundant or pays better.

The soil for this crop should be rich, deep, and well-pulverized. Subsoil plowing it operates very beneficially. The seed should be sown in drills, and the drills some twenty-girld inches apart to admit of ned out, leaving the strongest remain, to about four inches apart. We have known a thousand bushels to be raised to an acre;

a thousand bushels to be raised to an acre; five hundred are a common crop.

They are a very nutritious food for horses, cattle and swine; the latter fatten upon them better than upon any other root, and are very fond of them.

Seed may be planted up to the 15th or 20th of May. Some persons even plant later, but it is not to be recommended.

As to the culture of carrots, the same details may be pursued. There is scarcely a shade of difference. The variety called the Orange is the best for field culture.

Spriouting Sweet-Potatoes.—"First, make a frame of boards if the ground be cold or heavy on the surface; if light or sandy, dig out to the depth of eight to twelve inches from the bottom of the bed to the top of the frame in front, and twenty six or twenty-eight for back, to give a good slope or water-shed four and a half to five feet from front to back; take good fresh stable-manure and coarse hay—bog hay is best; first a layer of hay, then manure, then repeat; pack it well to one foot in depth, wet it slightly, cover with three inches of sandy loam, lay in the potatoes—if small, whole; if large cut in two from end to end, with cut-side down; cover with one and a half inches of light sand loam. Leave so till the potatoes begin to sprout, then cover with the same to three inches to insure good and plenty of fibrous roots; when the plants are three inches high they are ready to transplant to the hills or rows for growing. Uso glass or sash to give a quicker growth to the plants; keep the temperature in the frame from seventy-five to ninety, if possible. Make hot-beds from April 10th to 20th, according to the season.

OSAGE ORANGE SEED.—The seed is to be soaked in blood-warm water for a week, changing the water every day. At the end of a week turn off the water, and cover the seed with thick woolen cloths in order to keep them moist, and set them near the stove until they sprout. Examine the seed daily, and stir them with the hand. When minute sprouts appear just breaking through, the seed should be good, light, rich land, and the seeds be sown as early as possible. Sow in drills, two inches deep and a foot apart, putting about twenty-live seeds to the foot, and covering before the seed is dry. The young plants are to be carefully weeded and cultivated during the summer, and thinned wherever they are crowded. In the fall the plants are taken up, assorted into sizes, and heeled-in.

done with these few movements, and he passes on to the next plant. A good hand will set out 20 plants in a minute, which is at the rate of 12,000 in ten hours. Making ample allowance for interruptions, any clever workman will set out 6,000 in a day. My foreman, who was nine years with Peter Henderson, and is on his fourth year with me, will set out 9,000 plants a day, besides marking the rows and bossing the job. Any man will plant as fast as an equally good man or boy will drop, and the delay, if any, usually comes from the pullers.

After the plants are out, the field need not be touched until they are well established and have a good set of leaves. Then a horse-hoe or a one-horse sub-soil plow may be run through the spaces, and the rows between the plants may be stirred up with a pronged hoe. There is absolutely no finger work to be done, and the field may be gone over with less work than would be required for the second hoeing of a field of drilled corn. Enough plants may be left in the seed-bed to make a crop, and if the land is equally good, these roots will not be nearly so good as the transplanted ones.
