



late Lord Western of Essexshire, and has since been extensively bred and disseminated by W. Fisher Hobbs, who had unusual facilities for obtaining the very best animals, on which he has since made considerable improvement. This breed is said to have carried off a very large proportion of the prizes at the shows of the justly celebrated Smithfield Club, England.

This breed was derived from a cross of the native hogs of Essexshire with the Neapolitan; they closely resemble the last named, both in form and color, but have better form and size, much more hardiness, and a better constitution.

Stevens, in his "Book of the Farm," says of them:—"As to the breed that shows the greatest disposition to fatten, together with a due proportion of lean meat I never saw one equal to that originated by Lord Western, of Essex.
