The hay should be put into neat cocks before sundown on the day it is cut, and capped, if the slightest signs of rain are visible. Hay thus put up if left stand in cock two or three days. up, if left stand in cock two or three days -the weather being dry-will cure much better and brighter than in any other way; but to hasten the process, if the cocks are opened to the sun the next day after being put up, the hay will be ready for the mow. 
