LETTING FARM TOOLS,-The chairman exhibited a copy of a little book issued by the Farmers' Union of Framingham, Mass., containing their rules and regulations for letting tools. The following explanation was given in this book of the objects of the Association: Whatever may be the cause, expensive and efficient agricultural implements are not in common use. To pur-chase machinery capable of great results an outlay is often incurred out of proportion to the profits of agriculture .-But a great variety of the best tools owned in New England communities are worked to but a fraction of their capacity, although they are of vital importance to rural industry. Nowhere PERPERTUAL MOTION ! else are they so much needed. Like money, farm machinery is locked in the strongholds of a few. To release these implements and diffuse their usefulness to place the best tools within the reacl association. The charge-list has been formed on business principles. Tools will not be let unless both parties are benefited. As all persons may be added. benefited. As all persons may be aided, we invite them to extend the usefulnes of this system by adopting its method." Certain rules governing the letting of the tools were also appended, and the end of the book was ruled for the following entries: Name of hirer-toolwhen taken-when returned-charge. N. Y. FARMERS CLUB. JERSEYS FOR BEEF .- Rev. W. A. P. Dillingham writes to the Maine Farmer in praise of Jersey stock for beef. He says: "This Winter I have fattened and killed two Jerseys, both grade ani-mals. One was a three year old heifer that proved unfruitful, the other was a cow five years old, that proved unsatisfactory. They took on fat with remarkable facility. They each dressed off about five hundred pounds. I never fed animals that gained faster than they did. They uniformly ate their allow-

ance, and none of it went to waste. A ton of hay and fifteen bushels of meal will make as many pounds of beef when fed to a Jersey as when fed to a Durham. After they were killed the beef proved to be of unusual excellence. In fact, and to make a very modest statement, I never before had such beef on 2,000 Yards of New Dress Goods my dinner-table. Its tenderness, its juiciness, its richness are in degrees of remarkable fullness. This beef seems to be much richer than ordinary grades of beef in the market, as the Jersey butter is superior to common butter."



meal or grain as is necessary to keep them in fair condition.

Summer is the time to make pork; making it in Winter is much like running a boat against a wind and tide; it requires too much food to keep up the supply of animal heat. If hogs have plenty of grass in Summer, and about half the grain they will eat, they will fatten rapidly, and my belief is that three pounds of pork can be made from less grain in this way than one pound can be in cold weather with a hog in a close pen. The grass is cooling and loosening, and counteracts the feverish

Another important consideration in favor of such a diet is cost, which is merely nominal as compared with grain alone. Free access to water and a cool clean shade is essential to the comfort and consequent growth and thrift of the pigs. The hog delights in a cool, damp locality; and is very sensitive to heat and cold, and suffers severely from expo-

is plenty of grass on the ground. They should be allowed to have all the grass they will eat as early in the Spring as possible, and clover or tame hay is good for them in Winter. They are fond of it. Hogs that have run to grass all fed to advantage six weeks or two

them to the manure pile.

Milk is a very cooling drink, and almost indispensable in raising young pigs. But very little corn and no corn meal should be fed to young pigs, before they are four months old. The effects

of corn and raw corn meal on young pigs are these: The pigs will first be costive, then they will scour. They will begin to rub against everything they can get against, and will rub their hair off. Their skin will have a red and dry appearance. A dry black scruf will begin to form on them, and the more of poorer they will get. The best thing that can be done for a pig in this condition is to give him a thorough washing in warm rain water or sour milk .-Sour milk is best. Coarse flour or middlings from rye or wheat, when made into a thin drinkable slop with milk, is the best food for young pigs, except bread and milk. Bread is good for very young pigs, because it has been leav-vened. Food has to ferment before it will digest, and if fed to a young pig before fermented, it will overtask his stomach and spoil him. Lettuce is good for young pigs. It will stop the scours on them. The middlings should be put with the milk at night, after the feeding has been done, and allowed to be in the
