FARM AND HOUSEHOLD. Gathering manure should be the work of every day during the year not

otherwise peremptorily occupied. There can not be too much manure on hand .-Where farms are in condition and car rving a fair allowance of stock, this work is a matter of routine, and is constantly in operation. But where the farm i poor, has been run down, and is now in process of recuperation, it is a matter of anxiety and labor to make most of all sources of fertilizing matter. Where a deposit of muck is at hand the matter is simplified. To a poor farm, it is like a bank deposit to a poor man. His drafts are there instantly honored .-Almost any day of the year one may dig muck, and a goodly pile may be in course of preparatiom for his compostheap. The stables should be spread with it six inches deep: only, however, when well cured, and dry and pulver-ized. The cow-sheds should be abundantly supplied with it, and the cows be kept up at least during the night, if not during part of the day, and foddered with green feed. The fowl-house should be liberally spread with it, and it may pe put a foot deep in the hog-pen, to be turned over and over by the animals. An earth-closet should be supplied with it, and a pile of it should receive the kitchen and chamber slops. TRIMMINGS, When all these demands are supplied pile up a quantity of muck and mix a bushel of freshly slaken lime with every SHIRTS, DRAWERS, load of it, taking care to cover up the lime with several inches of the muck .-Salt or brine, in small quanities, will make a valuable addition, as it will hasten its decomposition and increase its usefulness. When you have plenty of muck prepared and well mixed and rotted, spread it on the meadows at any LAMPS, BRUSHES, time of the year when you have the opportunity; dress the orchard with it, put it on the garden, give twenty loads per acre to the ground you have prepared for wheat, and harrow it in immediately Which are sold cheaper than they can be bought elsewhere. 
