Terrible Disaster. As the Staten Island ferry-boat West-field was starting from her dock at the foot of Whitehall street, next the Battery, New of Whitehall street, next the Battery, New York on Sunday last at 1:30 with a heavy load, composed mainly of the usual class of Sunday excursionists, to the number of about 300, her boiler burst, with, a tremendous explosion, shivering the entire upper works of the boat into a thousand pieces, and laying open the whole forward part of the hull from the very keel.

The spectacle on the fill-fated vossel subsequent to the explosion is beyond description. A great yawning abyss stretched from abaft the engine room close to the stern, and the deck seemed to have opened like a sepulchro to swallow its load of precious human freight in the dark hold beneath. The dead and dying were lying about in veyory direction among the debris of broken timbers, splinters and heavy machinery. From midships to the cut water the beat presented a vast hold filled with fragments of spars, beams and bul, warks and fragments of iron. Bodies, debris and portions of the wreck fell among the passengers and increased the confusion. the passengers and increased the confusion. Many people fell in the river, and being anable to help themselves, were drowned. Boiling water was scattered in all direction,


