I have some handsome verbenas, petumas and carnations blooming in all their richness and beauty where the early onions grew. The way I managed it was, as soon as an onion was pulled up for the table, I planted a flower in its place, and the result is most CUANO, LIME, BONE, PLASTER, satisfactory.

I like the good old way of exchange ing flower roots. Stingyness with flowers is a very churlish folly. We benefit ourselves as much as our neigh bor by sharing our cuttings, roots and seeds with him for others we have not. Both gardens grow gayer and richer for the interchange, and the owners suffer

I think it does flowers good to divide Spring and Summer Clothing the roots; they get too thick. One or two in a place do much better. This is the way I treat my roses:-

In June, as soon as they are done blooming, I give them a regular dress-Gents' Furnishing Goods, ing up. In the first place, I take a snarp Kune and cut away all the old wood; if there are too many shrubs I reaches, Toinatoes and Corn; Table Salt and Sences; dig them up and set them out as cuttings in some shady place to get rooted.

I then tie up all the young branches firmly to a strong stick. Now they want some good compost to strengthen them for the next crop of roses. I find that the droppings from the chicken roosts are most excellent, mixed with a M. LIEBERMAN. little sand; say half a peck to each bush. Spread it on the top of the ground, let it extend out about a foot all round the roots. You will be surprised at the effect it will have on the growth of your bushes. I prune my roses every month and give them a topdressing, and they more than doubly repay me with an abundance of most beautiful roses. Roses will not bloom in the shade; they love air and sunshine. A rose will grow much higher and stronger when it has some strong

> string handy, and whenever you see a oose branch fasten it at once.

> Insects must be carefully looked after, and resolutely destroyed, or they soon will destroy all hopes for a crop of roses. A good way is to take a bucket of water and pour some coal oil in it. Then take an old broom or wisk and sprinkle the bushes well with the mixture. This will destroy all insects. Do not use too much oil or you will injure the leaves. MARY, the Farmer's Daughter.


