Tammany at the Bar.

The New York Times has published a supplement containing a transcript from the books of Controller Connoly, of the New York City Ring, which shows the stealings of four firms. The following are the bills for Sunday work. No one believes that the work here charged for was done on Sunday, or done at all: but it shows the consultation of the potential properties. It operates on the outside row of corn, passing continuously around the field. The stalks in each hill are allent off at once by two circular cutters, revolving arms and an endlance. The stalks are carried thence, butts first, by revolving arms and an endlance and carry them rapidly through. The ears, however, being too large to pass between the rollers, are pushed out of the husks in the neatest and most effective manner. This is because the joint of the ear with the stalk is the weak-est point and easly broken by contact with the rollers. The ears fall into a hopper and are taken up by an elevator to a trough, on the road to Konigsberg, west of the the civilization of the nineteenth century by two horses. It operates on the outside and are taken up by an elevator to a trough, whence they slide into a wagon that accompanies the machine, and carries the corn to the granary. The stalks with the husks entire are passed between the rollers to a platform, and when sufficient for a bundle patterin, and when sunction to a bundle to accumulate it opens and drops them on the ground ready for binding and stacking. The machine is provided with an arrango-ment by which the corn when it has fallen can be lifted off the ground and brought into contract with the saws. provision is also made for cutting the corn while green, and placing it in bundles without husking; that process to be the subject of another

operation of passing between the rollers when the corn has became perfectly ripo. It is worthy of note that the busking is accomplished without shelling a grain of corn. One man and four boys with three horses have run a working model of the machine, and cut and husked corn at the rate of ten acres per day, saving the stalks and husks perfectly.
