

FARM AND HOUSEHOLD. Extract from Mr. Lyman's Valedictory

Address before the N. Y. Farmers' Club. We spread our manures and our seed over too much surface. We get ten bushels of rye from two acres, when we might take it from one. We run over fifty acres for fifty tons of hay, when it could be cut with less labor and of better quality from twenty-five acres. None of our acres but will bring some income, without cultivation, by a growth of wood. East of the mountains it would be wisdom to give back half the surface now cleared to forest, and concentrate all our pains and manures and seed on the remaining half.

The grand defect of all American farming is indifference to the methods by which the manure pile may be increased. East of the mountains we know that we ought to use more manure, but neglect the sources and the arts by which we are to make our lands productive. West of the mountains, a vast spread of soil naturally productive and cheap has flattered the Western farmer and cut the sinews of his thrift. He has neglected manure, he has despised dung, he has pitied the less fortunate who break their backs and tire their arms forking over compost piles; mean-time the power of his soil has fallen away from 35 to 30 bushels of wheat, from 30 to 25, from 25 to 20, from 20 to 15, in the older States of the West, and the crop is still in the down grade, and will go as low as poor old Virginia, where five bushels to the acre is a fair erop of wheat. Nothing will arrest this decline in the great staple of bread but the saving of rich manure. We can not make rich manure without rich food. We cannot use rich—i. e., oily and concentrated-food to advantage except in stall-feeding cattle. Hence the distinct tion between grain farm and stock farm ought to be unknown. Every grain farm should fatten stock and every stock farm should produce large crops of grain. The best farmer is he who gives society the greatest number of juicy steaks and roasts and the materials for the greatest number of wheaten loaves. Him I call the best farmer; he is more, he is the best MAN in society. The rest of usetalkers, writers, traders-live by our wits; we milk the cow; we suck the public pap; we are fruges consumere NATI. The creator of food is father to all energies and values; you may call him a mudsill, but the whole fabric and superstructure of society, all pillars of state, the platform, the pulpit, the sing ers' gallery, the impressiveness of the facade, the streaming glories of the flagstaff, all rest upon that mudsill! We want a science of farming that is an American system. The Old World can teach us much, but all examples from England or France or Germany need their constant qualification; the

European climato is much cooler and moister than ours, its winters are milder, and a good square day's work can be bought for 25 cents. In all our adapta-tions of continental example we are to remember that economy of labor and uncertainty of securing laborers are

lements which every one of us must ake into account. Four years in six our crops are shortened for lack of water in some part of the growing season. The ways by which this difficulty can be mastered are true problems for every farmer .-We need cheap and practicable methods of spreading the rainfall of spring through the growing season. It can be done by ponds, cisterns, windmills, and irrigating canals. As a general remark, \$500 well expended will give one com mand over ten acres to make them as wet as the greatest prosperity of vege-tation requires. This full command of moisture will add over \$50 to the value of any cultivated acre. In many cases view of the importance and nobleness of his work. Hunger has upset the strongest and oldest governments of history. Hunger will not threaten the stability of our constitution for ages if our farming is as good as our locomo tion; if we apply as good thinking to the solving of problems in agriculture as we do to the problems of medicine or law or mechanics. He who doe most to make our farming perfect is

working directly to make our Constitu-tion perpetual in time and a model for all the races. SELECTING SEED .- All improvements in seed have been the result of selec-tion. The best seed selected for use has yielded an improved product, and the process again and again repeated has finally resulted in securing the plant, root, or grain desired. Corn has been much improved by a course of selection, but farmers who have most at stake in this matter are too careless to carry out experiments to a final result. Now, if a seed could be secured that would pro-duce with certainty two cars of corn to each stalk, our corn crop would be vastly increased, and it is pretty certain that if for a succession of years no corn were planted but that which produced two ears to the stalk, the peculiarity would become fixed, and a corn having this as become an established variety. What we need is that farmers should be careful to select their seed ears while the corn is standing, that they may be sure that the ears selected are perfect in shape and filling out, early in ripening, and grow double. An improvement of ten per cent only in the corn crop from judicious selection of seed, would add a value of fifty millions of dollars to the agricultural income of the country, and this is no mean item.

To KEEP BUILDINGS COOL-Dwelling houses and stables may be kept cool during the hot weather throughtout the middle of the day by the simple plan of keeping them closed. A thorough ventilation early in the morning, about sunrise, will clear out all the vitiated or impure air, and reduce the buildings to the temperature of the outside air, which at this season is cool. When sufficiently rentilated, close perfectly and keep dark ventilated, close perfectly and keep dark The house will then retain the coolness of the morning, although the outside air may increase 20 deg. in temperature. The stables will be cool and free from flies, and the cattle, brought in from the pastures at eleven o'clock, by which time they will be filled, will enjoy the quiet, dark, and cool stable, and will remain there gladly until five in the afternoon, when they will feed again with a relish. City houses may be kept cool on the same plan. No draft of air should be permitted to enter, nor ray of sun, until late in the afternoon, when free airing and sunning may be given.

CUTTING TIMBER.—If posts or rails are needed for service during the winter, the trees may be cut now while in full leaf. Allowed to lie as the trees are cut, the evaporation from the leaves will drain the timber nearly dry, when a short exposure afterwards will very effectually season it. The economy of using posts and rails peeled is very great: the loose bark retains moisture between it and the wood, and the sap wood soon rots. When peeled the sap wood dries, and will last many years


