FARM AND HOUSEHOLD. Don't Sell the Best Calves.

A really choice cow will readily bring eighty to one hundred dollars. A cow that

will make one pound of butter per day dur-

ing six months, and half a pound per day

during two or three months more, is cheaper

at one hundred dollars, than a cow that will do half as much, would be at fifty dolars. Poor cows are more plentiful than good ones; and where little or no attention s given to improving the stock, good cows are fast becoming scarcer. If one wants to find good cows, he has to follow the track of a drover, who is constantly raking over the country places to supply the demand of the large towns and great cities. Thus the farming localities are being constantly depleted. But this would be of no Thus the farming localities are being constantly depleted. But this would be of no damage, if the supply was kept up, and this constant draft replaced with young stock. Here lies the trouble. Not only are cows in demand, but calves are equally sought after. The farmer is constantly tempted by drovers and butchers, from far and near, to dispose of his calves. The majority of them can not withstand the flutter of a greenback ornamented with a large X. The choicest calves are of course selected, and these are generally from the best cows. Ten dollars is thought to be a good price for a calf four weeks old, and pays better than fifteen for a year-old animal. So would five dollars a bushel be a high price for potato sets; but few farmers would be tempted to tear them out of newly planted hills for that money. But does he not sell the seed of a valuable crop, when he parts with his best calves? Many men say it costs more to raise a cow than to buy one. This is palpably wrong, as will be seen if they sit down and figure it out. But if it were true now, it could not long remain so; for cews must be raised; and those who raise them must be paid profitably, or they will not do it. We content that there is some ground for the idea. and those who raise them must be pair profitably, or they will not do it. We con-fess that there is some ground for the idea that it does not pay to raise cows, wrong as it may be, and it lies just here: The poorest calves are selected for rearing; and as it costs as much, and sometimes more, to feel a near self from a poor cow, until poorest calves are selected for rearing; and so it costs as much, and sometimes more, to feed a poor calf from a poor cow, until maturity, when it probably is worth twenty-five or thirty dollars only, as it does to feed a good calf, that would make a cow worth double that money at two years old. There is actually a loss in the operation, and the farmer is out of pocket, not only indirectly, but directly, in having spent more than he can get back again. A merchant doing business thus, would soon find work for an assignee or the bankrupt court; but such are the advantages of the farmer's occupation, that he is able to live, and often do well, in spite of his unbusiness-like methods. Let him make farming a business; let him calculate and figure out results, as other men are obliged to do; and it will be found that there is no operation on the farm but pays fair interest over and above a good remuneration for labor and attention, if such labor and attention are only well directed; and most surely will he find that there is more money in a good helforwell directed; and most surely will he find that there is more money in a good helfer-calf, than any butcher could afford to give him, if he will only give the animal time to show it. So with a bull-calf; if one is to be raised, select the best. It is by a course of selection, that the present race of blooded stock have been built up; as it is by a contrary course, that the native stock has been run down. Our "native" stock has sprung from good sources, and if the best calves are retained on the farm, there will soon be a better supply of good cows.

Sheep-killing Dogs

Pretty much the whole canine fraternity may be classed as "sheep-killing dogs." It runs in the blood back to the first dog, It runs in the blood back to the first dog, whether we locate him in the Mosaic creation, or clear back in protoplasm. We have no doubt the first dog was born with his teeth at a sheep's neck, sucking blood several days before he took to his mother's milk. We do not know how else to account for the blood-thirstiness of dogs, and their penchant for sheep's blood in particular, mon any other hypothesis. Of course no penchant for sheep's blood in particular, upon any other hypothesis. Of course no man's dog in particular has this propensity and of course your own dog never kills sheep. We never found a dog owner that would acknowledge his cur guilty, unless two men were ready to swear that they caught him in the act, and then it is always the first offense though hundreds of sheep have been mangled and killed in the neighborhood. The old rule of presumed innocence will not do in this case. It is to be presumed that every dog, no matter what presumed that every dog, no matter what his breed, size, or training, is a born sheep-killer. we lately caught a trained pointer, whose acquaintance was presumed to be e was presun mainly with birds, in the act of running We have sold a number of the above Machines this son, and they have proved the assertion made in our tadvertisement—The best Michines ever offered to farmers of this community."

Persons wishing to purchase Machines can see them and nothing else. This instinct for sleep's blood is absolutely uncontrollable, and we may as well face this fact at once, and base our legislation upon it. Even here, in Connecticut, where we have laws, and attempt to regulate animal instincts, and to some extent mete out justice between man and man, our dogs' numbered and heavily taxed, kill sheep, and farmers get only a partial compensation for their losses. If the dog tax meets these losses, well and good; if not, the farmers suffer. This, of course, and the standard of the standard o operates disastrously upon sheep-raising, one of the most profitable branches of hus-bandry in the Eastern States. It is espebandry in the Eastern States. It is especially discouraging to investments in thorough bred animals. Cotswolds, with good pedigree, are worth a hundred dollars each. Ten of these animals cost a farmer a thousand dollars. It would be a very small job for a dog, not worth ten cents for any purpose but the manure heap, to destroy all this property in one night. It is a smart agricultural town that collects the tax on five hundred dogs, and gets a thousand dollars into its treasury. Fow men can afford to run the risk of putting so much money into stock that is made so men can afford to run the risk of putting so much money into stock that is made so insecure. Dogs are the great hindrance to the extension of sheep culture. We want a radical change in the character of our legislation. The law should presume that the whole race is guilty, and not only tax dog owners, but make them responsible for every sheep killed by dogs in the town. If I keep no dog, there is no sense in taxing me for what my neighbor destroys by his vicious taste. If there are but ten men in town that wish to indulge in this luxury, let them give bonds to pay the damage done by their curs. Let them be compelled to keep their dogs muzzled or caged as they would wolves. We would not have any man's freedom interfered with in any way. man's freedom interfered with in any way Ho may keep rattlesnakes, if it suits his fancy, but he should not keep them on the highway or in his neighbor's pasture.—
Dogs are much more dangerous to man and beast than serpents.—Hearth and Home.

THE WASTE OF LIQUID MANURE.-Very few barns or barn-yards are so arranged as to save the liquid manure. The loss resulting from such a want of proper residing from sich a want of proper arrangement is a very serious one, more so than most farmers would imagine. In the first place, the quantity of liquid matter which might be saved from a pair of horses and a half a dozen cows amounts to 80,000 pounds yearly. This is equal to about 10,000, which, diluted with an equal amounts of water would furnish each quantity of water, would furnish each year a dressing of 1,000 gallons per acre to twenty acres of land. Fermenting liquid manure needs this addition of water for manure needs this addition of water for the purpose of retaining the ammonia which would otherwise pass off and be lost. The solid matter contained in the above quantity of liquid is equal to nearly three tons, and is worth as much as the best guano. The money value would therefore be about \$200—an amount that is well worth saving. Much less than this amount would make the drains and tank required to save the manure, so that the outlay to save the manure, so that the outlay would be more than repaid the first year. Or, if proper absorbents were freely used, the whole of the liquids might be saved without any outlay at all.

THE Ansonnext Powers of a Mellow Soil.—Experiments have shown that a mellow, loamy soil is capable of absorbing in twelve hours, water equal to two percent of its weight. If any argument were needed to keep the soil mellow, here is a most powerful one to induce us. For this property possessed by a mellow soil is one that in a dry season is able to give it the power of maturing a crop, when a hardened surface would be unable to do so. A surface that is impenetrable to the atmosphere, of course could not absorb any of the moisture with which the atmosphere is charged. But when rendered free from THE ABSORBENT POWERS OF A MELLOW the moisture with which the atmosphere is charged. But when rendered free from lumps by repeated plowings and harrow-ings, each change of temperature causes a circulation of air throughout the mass of soil, which is free then to absorb all the moisture coming in contact with it until it is saturated. So, then, the more the soil is mellowed by cultivation, the less it is injuriously affected by drouth, and the betis it enabled to mature a fair crop in spite of the absence of rain.
