I know that I am right because I know that Liberty is right; for Christ teaches it, and Christ is God. I have told them that a house divided against itself cannot stand; and Christ and Reason say the same, and they will find it so. Douglass don't care whether slavery is voted up or down, but God cares, and humanity cares, and I care, and with God's help I shall not fail. 
