If any one thing above all others should engage the thoughts and call forth the efforts of the generation which now occupies this world's stage, it is that of making home attractive. And no class of persons is so deeply interested in this vital element of the social world, as the farmer. His occupation is dubbed a bore and drudge so almost universally by his sons and daughters, that it forces the belief that there is something wrong in the economy, or present structure and arrangement of society pertaining to the rural industries. This pertaining to the rural industries. This state of things arises, in a great measure, from the isolated manner in which the agricultural community labors. Little or no effort has been made by combination to create a rivalry to excel in any department of agriculture. The country has been content to adopt with submission the fashions and manners set by the city, without question or examination; no matter how unsuited to its calling. .In place of aiming to make home attractive by tasteful surroundings, native to the country, fences are constructed of the crudest materials, yards are patches of land despoiled of their natural beauty, and left uncared for by artificial adornment. A raw, uncultivated home, begets uncouth, coarse manners and slovenly habits; and the sharp contrast between the rural homestead and the town or city residence, makes a quick and strong impression upon the susceptible mind of

Again, man is a gregarious animal. He loves the company of his fellows, and social companionship. Enrich this companionship by cultivated tastes and manners, by the attractions of neatness and tidiness in all home surroundings, and you will soon supply allurements that will lay strong hold upon the ever restless and active mind of the young. Such pleasant associations, however, to be of permanent utility, must be connected with everyday life and business. But while the rural or agricultural population maintain their present isolated and repulsive status toward each other, this wished-for state of affairs cannot be inaugurated.

By forming neighborhood associations in the long Winter evenings, which shall have a proper organization, with officers, who shall have well defined duties, and a working membership composed of both sexes, the first, and a very important step, will be taken in a much demanded reform, which will tend to curb the tendency of the times to run to extravagance and shoddy tastes, with their train of deceit, and corrupt morals.

If the agricultural classes would confer together, and take up the different branches of their daily business, and become familiar with the latest improvements and discoveries bearing upon them, soon an absorbing interest would be felt in them, which is not now. And when it began to appear how those new ideas could be turned to profit, the interest would greatly increase. Premiums, costing but little, and other awards of merit, might be given, to excite the ambition of members to excel in producing the best stock, crops, flowers, fruit, or plans for conducting any branch of busiwould improve the society and morals of the community, by making it more social, more friendly, and hence more attractive. The tone, morals and intelligence of the rural population, by the simple and practimeans of association, would be raised a hundred per cent., in a short time, while the wealth and enjoyment of the neighborhood would receive a corresponding impetus. These unappropriated materials of genuine wealth lie dormant in every community, in exhaustless stores, waiting to be utalized.
