American Agriculturist. METHOD OF UTILIZING BONES .- The utility of raty bones is much circum scribed by the difficulty of bringing them into a fit state for use. A rough method of cracking them, or reducing them to large fragments by means of a heavy pounder or sledge, may be employed where they are intended for use in an orchard or vineyard, where they may be toppled at the roots of a permanently established fruit tree. But to become useful to annual crops they must be brought to a more practical shape. When coarsely broken they may be re-duced by caustic lye more slowly but with much less inconvenience than by sulphuric acid. To accomplish this, rough but tight box, not over eighteer WINDOW SHADES, READY-MADE CLOTHING inches deep, is needed. when these are bored, turn half way round and line on each side, and rip apart with a hand saw—the back should be shaved of i. Make the rounds of good white oak, and for a ladder of from 16 to 24 feet, the lower round may be 30 inches lorg, and the upper one 18 to 20 inches lorg, and the upper one 18 to 20 inches . In case of fire a ladder of about sixteen 'cet long, with hooks on the end, to catch on the comb of the roof and lie flat on it, is very useful.
