FARM AND HOUSEHOLD. PRESENT HINTS FOR FARMERS.

It is said that the Chinese are in the habit of settling up and balancing all their accounts, with whosoever they have had any dealings, on the first of the year. A good idea, as I think, and worthy of adoption by all in every land. Particularly should remember all small accounts, and those who are living at a distance, and cannot call on us in person for their duties.

If we are farmers, as I suppose a major-Ity of the readers of the Telegraph are, this is the best of all times in the year to review the failures of the past, and take steps to avoid them in the future. A great help in this is a diary, the fuller in particulars the better. Once acquire the habit of penning a few lines at the close of the day's labors and it is no task. Besides it is a most efficient help in disciplining the mind. My friend, if you do not now keep a diary let me advise you to begin in January, 1872. My word for it, you will be surprised to find so much information conlensed in a few lines. You will acquire a habit of conciseness, of directness, that nine times in ten will show itself in the general management of your business; for it will set you thinking, comparing, reasoning from cause to effect. The American farmer thinks as a class perhaps more than those of any other nation. Still there is room for far more brain-work. How satisfactory to any farmer must be the knowledge of the fact that in a few

noments he can tell what it cost him to raise one hundred bushels of corn seven years ago, what he got a bushel for what he sold, and what the average price he had received in the past ten years. So with all his crops. He who keeps a compact, concise diary for a few years, will be able to tell just the crop that one year with another pays best. If he is observing and has failures, as almost all will have more or less, he will find those failures noted and the probable cause for them stated. In this way a diary enlarges the mind, as it ena-Yard of Hill & Alexander, I am bles one to definitely remember more facts prepared to fill orders for all than he otherwise would or could. However retentive our minds may be, we can not recollect all we see, or all we hear; but the pen will fasten the fact where we can call up the subject at our leisure. For years I have kept a diary; I have quite a pile of books that have been filled in this way, and not one of them would I exchange or sell for four times its cost, and this I think you will find to be the case with all who keep them. If it were not taking up too much valuable room, I would like to tell you just how much work I laid out upon a piece of corn in 1864. Suffice it to say the piece contained eight acres, was interval land on Tiflin river, ten years cleared from heavy timber; nine years seeded to grass; soil sandy loam. The whole cost of raising that crop was a fraction less than fourteen cents per bushel of ears, seventy pounds. 

The Board of School Commissioners commenced operations in May, 188, with a debt of \$3,152.0; \$3,152.75 of this was money due J. Since that time the School Commissioners have built and paid for twelve entirely new school houses, and partially paid for two new ones, built before their entrance into office; all these houses are of the best character; the judgment of the Board Jeing that it wise economy to build houses in the best manner. There are two more new school houses built, but not yet paid or. or,
Six school houses have been greatly enlarged or otherwise modified, rendering them more
complete for school purposes,
This has been accomplished by an expenditure of \$21,303.76 for this purpose alone. This is exclusive of the incidental repairs constantly needed in the schools.
