Nay! what each individual item in the crop costs, and therefore are enabled to find at any time and for any series of years the profit or loss on each crop, and consequently what crop pays best for one year or a series of years. On large estates book-keeping is very complicated, because the farmer, having a threefold profession-that of producer, manufacturer, and merchant-his dealings are large and necessarily morse complicated than that of the ordinary farmer. One any farm would pay for keeping the books, and this cost would be decreased propor enough to employ the entire time of an cost ten or twenty times.
