All the property, etc., vested in the public school authorities of any county for the use of schools is transferred to and vested in the "Board of County Commissioners," instead of "County School Commission. instead of " County School Commission-

'The Board of County School Commis-The Board of County School Commis-sioners shall make out and publish annually in the month of September (in at least two newspapers publised in their respective counties, if there be two, and of opposite politics, if there be such) a detailed, min-ute and accurate statement of the expenses of their said schools, specifying therein each particular item, and for what and to whom paid."

The Board of District School Trustees shall cause instruction to be given ten months in the year, if possible.

The provisions relating to the certificate to be issued by the County Examiners to teachers are qualified as follows:

"Nor shall such certificate continue in force for more than six months, unless the person receiving the same shall satisfy the Examiner of his fitness for governing a school, and his ability to impart instruction in the varied branches taught in the public schools; but when the Examiner shall have satisfied himself upon these points, he shall be empowered to issue a certificate, which shall continue in force for three years."

The law levies a State tax of eleven cents on the \$100, being an increase of one cent over the law. It also provides that in addition to the Boards of County School Commissioners " the Secretaries, Examiners and District School Trustees appointed under them," shall serve out the full term for which they were appointed. The sections in relation to colored

schools are changed as follows: " Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Board of County School Commissioners to establish one or more public schools in each election district, for all colored youths CLOVER SEED between six and twenty years of age, to which admission shall be free, and which shall be kept open as long as the other public schools of the particular county;

public schools of the particular county; provided the average attendance be not less than fifteen scholars.

"Sec. 2. These schools shall be under the direction of the Board of District School Trustees of the respective school districts within the limits of which they are astablished; they shall be subject to the
