The season has so far advanced that the farmers have got fairly to work, which will not be suspended till the frosts of next winter closes up the business of gathering the crops that have been made by the aid of six months incessant labor. Every farmer, it is presumed, has laid his plans for the year, and will go dilligently forward to carry them out. How many have learned from former years' experience, valuable lessons? And how many are there who have changed in any material respect, the retine of twenty or more years ago?since, went to waste for the want of means to get them to market. matter and manured with the constituents of crops will yield many times the revenue to its owner that can be got out of the same number of acres that have been made sterril by constant cropping, ill usage and no nourishment in return for the heavy drains that from year to year have been made upon it. While it is admitted without gainsay that a rich soil is one of the most desirable investments that the farmer can command, the question of how to restore the hardly used farms to their original fertility is the question that is trouble some to solve. In this as in many other important measures to "make haste slowly" is decidedly the cheapest and surest mode of procedure.
