The greatest sensation of the country for the last fortnight has been the Cincinnati Convention. Whatever else it may bring forth, it has clearly developed the total distrust in the leaders of the Democratic party to go before the country on the merits of that party, and this con cession is the virtual abandonment of it as a national organization. Before the campaign is organized they have said that they have no hope of success in a straight-out contest with the Republican party in the next Presidential election. From speaking favorably of prominent moving spirits among the "Reformers" they have finally proclaimed that the Democratic party was willing to endorse a Republican candidate who had not de nounced the rebels too severely, and Adams, Davis, Trumbull, Greeley, Curtain, Gratz Brown, in fact almost any one whom the Cincinnati folks might see fit to annouce as their standard-bearer, would be endorsed by a ratification convention which would constitute the funeral ceremony of the party of effete ideas, which has been on its deathbed since 1861. N ACT to repeal section eighty-two of Article eight of the Code of Public Local Laws, entitled "Cecil Centry," sub-title "Elkton," and to re-enact the same with amendments. with amendments.
Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of faryland, That section eighty-two of Article eight of the Code of Public Local Laws, entitled "Cett county," but-title "Rikton," be and the same is hereby treesled, and re-enacted so as to read as follows:
