WENDELL PHILLIPS ON GREELEY. Robbery of the Third National Bank of

[ From the Baltimore American.] Decidedly the most bold, daring, well planned, well executed and successful bank robbery that has ever been perpetrated in Baltimore, or in the United States, was accomplished in this city between the hours money, of being headquarters of a gang of buglars. They paid three months' rent in advance (six hundred dollars) and took

the rooms occupied by the pretended commission merchants were vacant.

The sharp-eyed rogues before they rented the rooms observed that the bank vaults was next to the division wall and could be reached from the back office by digging through some thirty or forty inches of brick and mortar. They also observed that there was a capacious vault in the front office in which they could pack all the brick that it would be necessary to remove. There were plenty of drawers in which the detached pieces of mortar and other rubbish could be hid away. It is not surprising that they took the first floor of the marble front at the landlord's price and paid a quarter's rent in advance.

position and braced against a safe which was standing on the opposite side of the vault, and the shaft being placed against the broken lock it was forced in. The door was opened, and one of the compartments of the safe was rifled of its contents. A cast iron plate one inch in thickness was then broken through, apparently with a sledge hammer, and the second compart ment was open to the buglars. This plate could not have been broken except by hard blows many times repeated. The other operations might have been conduct-

ed with comparatively little noise.

In view of this astounding robbery it might be well to inquire is such a thing pos-sible as a burglar-proof vault. To all ap-pearances the vault of the Third National Bank was impregnable? The only exterior wall that it touches is nearly three feet ior wall that it touches is nearly three feet thick, and between this and its own rear wall is an iron plate three-eighths of an inch thick. The interior casing was made of very hard brick, laid in cement. But these strong walls were no protection against the arts of the burglars. A watchman who has always been considered hon-est and faithful was supposed to spend his struck.
