LOCAL AFFAIRS.

Local Miscellany.—The Mutual Building Association meets to night, when the books of series "C" will be closed.

The colored Abraham Lincoln Association of Wilmington and Elkton held their annual reunion and picnic in a grove near Elkton, on Monday last, where they spent a very quiet, pleasant day.

Rev. J. E. Alexander, of Elkton, will preach in the Presbyterian Church, of Chesapeake City, to-morrow, (Saturday), September 1st, at 10 o'clock, A. M., and 7 1/2 P. M.

The Office of the Howe Machine Co., will not be open for a few weeks yet at Elkton, on account of some necessary fitting-up to be done to the room.

Registration.—The registration of voters will take place in this county, on the usual places in each District, on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, the 17th, 18th and 19th of September.

Overcome by Heat.—Mr. George Hiddle, of Sassex Neck, this county, has been hauling his fruit to Middletown, this season, and had three horses overcome by the heat, last week, and on Thursday two more dropped to the wagon, about a mile and a half out of Middletown.

Sale of Town Property.—Mrs. Alice Gettings has sold her Elkton property, comprising the brick dwelling and grounds, formerly the property of P. C. Ricketts, deceased, on North street, for \$7,500.

Rev. Mr. Matlack, who has been absent at four camp meetings, held during four consecutive weeks of August, will preach in Elkton, to-morrow. He informs us that he will remain here and supply the pulpit of the M. E. Church during September and October.

Fair and Festival.—There will be a fair and festival held at the Zion M. E. Church, on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, 4th, 5th and 6th, of September.

Opening of the Elkton Academy.—The Fall term of the Elkton Academy, under new teachers and a more favorable auspices than for many years heretofore, will open on Monday next. Rev. J. A. Alexander, Assistant Principal, will have immediate charge of the girls, with supervision of course, of the whole school, and Mr. G. A. Blake, A. B., Assistant will be in charge of the boys.

Sale of Real Estate.—Jas. T. McCullough and W. J. Jones, Esqs., sold at Trustee's sale, on Tuesday last, the home place of the estate of the late Dr. T. A. Roberts, of Cecilton, containing 272 acres, and situated at the mouth of the Bohemia river; in the First District, for \$2,300.

Mr. Booth's process for manufacturing his celebrated ice cream is, as we have shown, to provide an absolutely pure article of cream. This is mixed with the flavoring and the proper quantity of sugar, which is about a pound of sugar to a gallon of cream—when vanilla is used as flavoring—the sugar being dissolved and strained to free it of all impurities.

There was a very large attendance at the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Cecil County Temperance Association, held at the Hotel 4 P. M., to organize and elect upon the programs for the mass meeting in the evening.

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Booth's Ice Creamery.—In the north limits of the corporation of Elkton, Mr. Joseph Booth owns a small, but valuable farm, which he devotes in great part to raising "straw" for the Elkton market, where he finds ready sale at remunerative prices for his produce.

The Messrs. Booth now monopolize the manufacture of ice cream for the Elkton market, as well as for the surrounding country lying within eight or ten miles. It is well known that for a plain, wedding party, ball or other large gathering, Booths are notified to prepare the ice cream.

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which it is ready to remove to smaller cases for customers. In the manufacture of ice cream and water ices, Mr. Booth and sons came from ten to twelve barrels of white sugar in one season. As small ants are very apt to be troublesome where they can have a free run, the barrels are placed on a ring of salt which effectively prevent the ants from reaching them.

In addition to the ice cream business, the Booths are becoming the most extensive truck farmers in this vicinity. This Summer from less than eight acres they sold \$100 worth of tomatoes; having the first \$100 worth in market sold at fancy prices as fast as they could be measured out.

In the Winter the Messrs. Booth store away about four hundred tons of ice for Summer use in manufacturing cream and other ices. When the ice cream season finally opens in the month of June they use the cream from about 120 cows in their busiest season, which is in June, July and August.

Our hopes brightened up when the room was secured, and the room rolled around and on going to the room we expected to find everything fixed up nicely and books already in it for they were expected to be ready by the time we entered the room we found in it the same old condition and I waited patiently for an explanation, until at last the services of the committee were explained by means of a prayer. Finally the reports of the committee were called for, and the Chairman arose to give his report, which was this: "I have the honor to report that we have postponed fixing up the Reading Room until cool weather, as they thought the weather was so warm that no one would come in to use it."
