The two fundamental principles to success in every enterprise are lost sight of in a great measure, in this proposed Bill-These are a knowledge of the work to be Every man of observation can bear witness that not more than one or two in a hundred who attempt to keep roads in order understand the first principles of the work they are blindly attempting. In order to have roads approximating anything like perfection, a man with some knowledge of engineering must direct the work. The work must be done like all successful public works, by contracting parties, who undertake to perform a certain stipulated contract in a specified manner,, for a specified time. And having entered into bonds to do the work, the men to be employed and the teams and tools are to be entirely in the hands of the contractors. Let the county road officers make the necessary survey of the county roads and divide them into districts; have the specification for the work drawn up by competent engineers, and the roads awarded to the lowest contractors, who shall give bonds to put them in order and keep them up to that standard for a certain specified time. Then let the work of these contractors be subject to the decision of competen inspectors who shall countersign all supervisor's drafts on the treasurer before payment for the work shall be done. Similar practice is pursued every day by contractors who build bridges, put up public buildings, make turnpikes, railroads, etc. etc. In fact all great public works are done under this system, except making and repairing county roads. Under such a common senso system our county highways would become in ten years, roads that it would be a pleasure to travel on, and we venture to predict, at not over three fourths of their present cost. If one third or fourth of the county roads now open were closed up and the remainder put in the order they should be, and kept so, the public would be immeasurably better accommodated. Many of our most used highways are located entirely wrong, and if made in the proper place and kept in the proper order, the value they would add to real estate is incalcuable.

Post Office and Post Roads, when his ap-plication for relief was pending in the Thir-iy-fourth Congress, and they are commented on in the report of that committee made to the House in 1856. These very letters are alluded to in the act of 1857, under the expression "affiducits and proofs on file in the House of Representatives;" they are mentioned in my printed argument, and were placed before you at the trial under convenient form for examination. 


